BURNS ELECTED: LYTLETON LOSES

[Continued from Page One.]

and the Laborites at Dundee. This regarded as an important indication of the trend of feeling in Scotland.

Defeats of former cabinet secretaries continue to be announced. Alfred Lyttleton, colonial secretary to the treasury in 1902-1903, being among those who lost their seats.

William Ashmead Bartlett Burdette-Coutts (Unionist) managed to maintain his seat for Westminster, but Sir Henry Seton-Kerr was defeated at St. Helens by Mr. Grover, a Laborite.

There was a great scene at Battersea tonight after the poll, showing John Burns to be elected, was announced. Mr. Burns stood on the balcony of the town hall on Lavender Hill, where he resides, wildly waving his hat, while fully 20,000 of his supporters were along the hill as wildly cheering.

It was a long time before Mr. Burns could get a hearing to announce the figures. Then he exclaimed: "Now go and tell my wife."

A few minutes afterwards Mr. Burns was escorted shoulder-high through the Battersea streets by thousands of workmen.

Walter Hume, chief secretary for Ireland, who lost his seat for South Bristol on Monday, was today elected to the Unionist seat for South Dublin, where the Unionist candidate had withdrawn in his favor.

Will Jos Go, Too?

Birmingham, England, Jan. 16.—The city is resting tonight preparatory to tomorrow's battle at the polls, which promises to be the most sensational in years.

Few persons venture to forecast the verdict, but it is evident that the Unionists are frightened by the results of the last three days, particularly that at Dudley, the nearest constituency thus far polled, where the Liberals gained a seat.

The Unionists are exerting every effort.

Joseph Chamberlain, contrary to his usual custom of non-participation in the canvass on an election day, at the urgent request of his supporters has agreed to visit the polls in his district tomorrow, and accompanied by Mrs. Chamberlain.

It generally is believed that two of the Birmingham districts are in danger of capture by the Liberals, but according to a statement issued by the Unionist committee tonight, the other five districts are safe.

The issue in Birmingham is that of straight fiscal reform, but it is affected by the side issues on which the workmen are split.

London, Jan. 16.—An unbroken series of 21 gains, including the triumph of Burns and the defeat of Lyttleton, former secretary for the colonies, is the contribution of the polls in the great Liberal-Labor landslide.

Fifty-six seats were decided. At the start 48 held by Conservatives with large majorities, changed their allegiance to the Democratic Labor party, and displaced knighted aristocrats with varying sentiments were merged into the gain.

To date 63 seats have gone to Liberals and 23 to Labor, as against a loss of only one. Less than half the seats are decided, but it seems not improbable that the Liberals will have a majority even over Labor, as well as Irish.

Wednesday will decide the personal fate of Chamberlain, but even the most sanguine Liberal will be surprised to defeat.

Today's fight was participated in by two Canadians, one being elected and one rejected. Baker holds Finsbury seat, gained for Liberals in the bye-election by a majority decreased from 758 to 587. In East Edinburgh Dr. Rankine lost against a Liberal majority of 1,281. He advocated tariff reform and pointed to Canada as an example of the success of protection. He was defeated by 4,174.

Burns, after a hand-to-hand fight, increased his Battersea majority from 254 to 1,600. Benn, his opponent, was formerly in the lumber business in Canada. Socialists also worked actively against Burns, alleging that he had been faithless to the cause by accepting office. Then Cherry, attorney-general for Ireland, invaded a Tory constituency, and turned a Conservative majority of 1,297 in Liverpool to a Liberal majority of 221. On the other hand, Lyttleton, the fourth ex-minister, was defeated.

A ray of comfort to tariff reformers comes from Durham, where a Conservative free trader faced a Conservative tariff reformer. The tariff reformer received 1,313; the free trader 880.

Labor has again a notable feature, of the fourteen candidates in the thirteen constituencies. On nine elected eight were not opposed by Liberals. In Dundee, held by two Liberals, the Labor candidate displaced a Liberal.

In Middleborough an Independent Labor candidate opposed a Labor-Liberal.

The latter won in Stockport, electing two members; Labor headed the polls, with the Liberal second.
