

BURY SECRETS OF QUEEN OF FINANCE

Many Details of Her Work Will Never Be Known Now She's Dead.

Pittsburg, Oct. 23.—Contrary to expectations no further steps were taken today before the supreme court of Pennsylvania, sitting here, to have the deposition of the late Cassie L. Chadwick made public.

The document was made by Mrs. Chadwick while a prisoner in the penitentiary at Columbus, O., to attorneys representing Mrs. W. H. C. Juttin, widow of the millionaire coal man, who charges James W. Friend and F. N. Hoffstet, officials of the Pressed Steel Car Company, with fraudulently obtaining \$1,000,000 worth of securities belonging to her husband's estate.

The court yesterday ordered the attorneys to file briefs, and it was thought the matter would be argued today, but the case was not reached. The effort to conceal the details of the case is causing much comment. Bank Examiner Charles Stark, who investigated the Chadwick case for the department of justice, said today, regarding the passbooks found by the referee in bankruptcy at Cleveland:

"In the full investigation I made of the affairs of Mrs. Chadwick in connection with the failure of the Oberlin (Ohio) bank, I found nothing to connect any bank in Pittsburg or in this vicinity with her."

"I have no doubt that the passbook in question was a forgery, as were others which she had in her possession, and which she used to help secure the credit and confidence of those with whom she was doing business. I know in some instances of Cleveland and New York banks where she had similar passbooks."

"In some instances all the entries in the passbooks were forgeries, while in others the original entry would be changed. For instance, in some cases of New York banks I found that the original entry was \$200, and this had been raised to \$200,000."

"This system of raising deposits in passbooks was carried on in many cases, and I visited many banks and found that this had been done, but I found no such condition of affairs in Pittsburg, and so conclude that the entire entry against the Pittsburg bank was a forgery."

"She was the most marvelous woman who ever wrecked a bank in my estimation, and this I found out when I went after the evidence I was directed to secure to aid the department of justice. Not one-tenth of the evidence I secured was used against her in the trial which resulted in her conviction, and many of the details of her work never will be known now that she is dead."

MONTREALERS LOSE MONEY BY THOUSANDS

Younger Firms Threw Stocks Overboard, Taking Desperate Chances.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—Hundreds of Montrealers were very heavy losers as a result of the big slump in the Wall Street market, and there is a great deal of sadness throughout the financial district today.

The large interest that almost all local houses have in the Wall Street market have made a lot of people apprehensive regarding the local market, and the manner in which some of the younger houses threw the stocks overboard in the latter part of the morning session showed they were taking desperate means in trying to protect themselves. They simply sold stocks for whatever they could get for them, and this resulted in declines of two and three points between sales of such stocks as Montreal Power, Twin City, the Mackay issues. A prominent broker, who said he had been in business for close to 30 years, stated that in all his experience he had never seen anything that could compare to the present demoralization in New York.

As yet no failures have occurred in Montreal, but hundreds of traders have lost thousands of dollars and will be badly crippled.

ASSASSIN TRIES TO KILL OFFICIALS

Treasurer and Comptroller of Customs and St. George Attacked by Negro.

Kingston, St. Vincent, B. W. I., Oct. 23.—Advises received here today from St. George, Island of Grenada, state that a desperate attempt has been made to assassinate the colonial treasurer and comptroller of customs, Norman Lockhart.

A dissatisfied colored revenue officer named Benjamin on Saturday last drew a revolver and fired three shots at the official while the latter was entering the treasury building. One of the bullets penetrated Lockhart's hand, while another lodged in his shoulder.

When an attempt was made to arrest the would-be assassin, he drew a knife and stabbed the treasurer in the side. The cashier, George McKie, who rushed to Lockhart's assistance, received serious gashes in the hand and thigh.

When taken into custody, Benjamin took a bottle of poison from his pocket and drank its contents before it could be taken away from him, and later refused to take an emetic. The authorities punctured his arm, and succeeded in injecting an antidote.

It is thought that Lockhart will recover. Benjamin, who was taken to prison, showed stolid indifference regarding his crime.

James Carr, while working on a scaffold on the Convent buildings in Dublin, fell a distance of 50 feet, and was killed.

A 6-year-old boy named Peter Currie Higgins, of Bonnybridge, was knocked down and killed by an express train.

Alex. Black, Hill House, Ainess, has won a bursary of \$75 in connection with the Aberdeen and North of Scotland School of Agriculture.

Andrew Gordon, London manager of the Union Bank of Scotland, died suddenly at the age of 60 years. Mr. Gordon was a native of Aberdeen.

The celebrations for the coming of age of Lord Cochrane, eldest son of the Earl of Dundonald, are to begin at Abergele, and will last for about a week.

Rev. James Hendry, of Burghhead, has been elected to the seat in the Duffus School Board rendered vacant by the resignation of Rev. James Mann.

A. B. Gunn, son of F. J. Gunn, of Goleville, is home on a visit from Buffalo, U. S. A. Mr. Gunn is one of the noted athletes of the United States.

The death is announced of Andrew Brown Cochrane, well known for many years as stationer at Govan Cross, and an office-bearer in Fairfield U. F. Church.

Rev. Gavin Lang, of Inverness, is to be presented with a testimonial on the attainment of his semi-jubilee as the minister of the West Parish Church.

The members of the Kirkwall Town Council who retire on November 1st are Provost Slater, Dean of Guild Garden, and Councillors John Flett and Col. Bailey.

Hugh R. McDougall, of Fort William, has been appointed assistant master in the Crossgates public school under the Dunfermline Board of Education.

The death has occurred at the age of 77 years of Allan Campbell, a merchant of Kilchoan, one of the most highly respected native residents of the place.

David Turnbull, of Fenwick and Rodondo, a well-known border laird, whose family owned extensive estates in Roxburghshire, has died in London at the age of 70.

Bermundsey Borough Council have decided to back their hall-keeper in a frock coat suit of a special kind of blue and provide him with a tall hat inclosed in a gold band.

At Slough, a youth of 19 said that he could not read. The father of the boy said that although he had been at school for a number of years he could neither read nor yet write his name.

James Grant, son of Daniel Grant, The Pier, Brora, who had been employed as engineer at the Keith woolen mills for a considerable time, was passed away at the age of 39 years.

The negotiations for the purchase of Tom Hood's house and grounds at Wanstead for \$100,000 for the public have failed and building operations have commenced on a portion of them.

Ten applicants for outdoor relief from the Hertford union from the village of Hertingfordbury totaled between them 75 years; on an average of nearly 80 years each; the oldest was 96.

The burial of Lord Aldenham and his youngest son the Hon. Henry Lloyd Gibbs took place in the pretty churchyard at Aldenham—father and son being interred simultaneously side by side.

One of the most eminent flute players of his day Henry Nicholson, died in 83rd year at Leicester. He took part in the first performance of "Elijah" under Mendelssohn at the Birmingham festival.

It is reported that Archdeacon M. Wilberforce, the popular Westminster Abbey preacher and chaplain to the House of Commons, will have the offer of the bishopric of Chichester, made vacant by the death of his brother.

Court Permits Defense of Action to Quash Recent Vote.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—A peculiar situation has arisen in the village of Hensall, Huron County, as a result of local option going into effect there. In an affidavit filed upon an application of Samuel Smiley to quash a resolution passed by the village council, it was stated that business had fallen off since the passing of the local option bylaw. There was no accommodation in the village for farmers and the traveling public and people consequently would not come into the village. Stables were rented for the accommodation of the public, but this did not answer the purpose, and on the application of 16 ratepayers the council passed a resolution not to oppose an action to upset the bylaw on condition that the party taking the action pay the expenses to which the village had been put. The motion today was to quash this resolution, but it was dismissed.
