UNION DIVIDED
ON CHURCH UNION

Congregationalist Speakers at Toronto Not Agreed.

VERY DECIDED VIEWS

Rev. J. W. Pedley Says That Church Should Have the Simplest Sort of Creed.

Toronto, June 1.—The report of the committee on church union was presented to the large number of Congregationalists who assembled in the Western Congregational Church this morning.

The committee recommended that its report and the documents agreed upon by the joint committee on church union last December be sent to the various Congregational churches for consideration. After due investigation and discussion, the various churches composing the union should return their verdict as to whether the denomination as a whole should enter upon the agreement as proposed by the joint committee.

Alterations or suggested improvements should be sent to the union before March 1, 1910.

Meeting to Decide.

As returned by the committee, the recommendation is almost identical with that passed by the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Hamilton.

Of the first five speakers, one was out and out for church union, one hesitatingly favorable, two non-committal, and one decidedly against.

The most effective speaker was the Rev. J. W. Pedley, pastor of the church in which the union is meeting. There is never any doubt upon this clerical veteran's position upon any subject.

In his vivid and intensely human way the man who for twenty-five years has been in the service of the church made a stirring plea for the amalgamation, and was warmly applauded throughout his discourse.

Mr. Pedley's Speech.

"Is it necessary to have any creed in the formation of a church?" he asked.

"Personally, I prefer to have no creed without any creed except that of the Apostle Paul, 'I believe in the Lord Jesus Christ.' If you have any other statement of creed you invite discussion. As for myself, I am not one of those who try to ride two horses which are going different ways."

"I am going to have both hands for the union as proposed by the committee. I want to have my hand in the fashioning of a new church with Luther and his kind. Swallowed up? Who is going to swallow us up? I tell you they will have something in their stomachs if they do. Why, the Presbyterians and Methodists have been arguing that they will be swallowed up. This is the day of combination and merger, and the principle is a sound one because it pits the conservation of energy against the dissipation of force. We live in the age of deeds rather than of creeds. It is not so much what a man says he believes as what he can say he is doing that convinces the world. I should like to have the joy of being in the swing of a great movement for ten years."

Rape the Confession.

"When I read the Westminster Confession of Faith (and I have read it, which is more than any Presbyterian I have ever met has done), with its elaborate explanation of everything in the heavens and on the earth, and in the waters under the earth, and the articles upon which the Methodist Church is founded, and, finally, the simple statement of our own belief, I am amazed that one hundred men could tear out of that mass of metaphysics a creed as simple as they have presented for your consideration."

"Judge a tree by its fruits," continued Mr. Pedley. "The Presbyterian and Methodist Churches of Canada have produced men of as large a calibre as the Congregational Church has done. Do you call the leaders of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches narrow men? Are they not contradiction of their own creeds? We have bid farewell to the ironbound beliefs of the middle ages."

"The keep of Congregationalism is not the individual church; the keep of Congregationalism is the individual conscience," said Rev. G. E. Reid, pastor of the Sherbrooke Congregational Church, Sherbrooke, Quebec. "If we are going into this church union merely to save our skin, we should reconsider our doctrine. If we are going into a larger church merely in the hope of finding a larger life, let us hold back. Unless there is some fuller guarantee of our creed and the sacred ordination of our ministry, I cannot see my way to accept the creed of the union committee."

Rev. J. K. Unsworth, Montreal, was in favor of church union on the basis of the agreement prepared by the committee on church union.

"The only thing that should be asked a candidate for the ministry is the simple affirmation that he is a member of Christ. There will be as many creeds as there are thinking Christians. Naturally, one jumps towards union, but the point is as to whether the creed of the Nineteen Articles is as elastic as Congregationalists would desire, holds me in suspense. But I believe in the liberal spirit of this country to settle the difficulty."

Mr. Unsworth then dealt strongly with the practical advantages of the proposed union.

The Overlapping.

"Shall the interests of the church suffer because a few idealists differ about matters of creed?" he asked. "Remember that ninety-five per cent of the people care nothing about these little differences about which we, as ministers, are so sensitive. In the little towns of Ontario, by reason of the overlapping of congregations, and the resulting jealousies, the work of God is handicapped. The walls between the churches have been crumbling during the last five years. We shall never be as far apart again. If we enter the union can we not trust in the God who has brought us through former difficulties not to desert us now?"

Wants a Stiff Creed.

"I am in favor of organic union," said Mr. Chas. R. Black, of Montreal. "So long as we can obtain it without sacrifice of principle. But I am convinced of the absolute necessity of a creed. Our forefathers gained our liberties for us. Shall we give them up for an idea? Union is good, but it is not everything. Uniformity is not admissible. If we join the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches now we shall be swallowed up. If we retain our individuality a few more years we can do more effective work."

"I am opposed to church union. I am not in favor of it. I stand upon the basis of Christian individualism and will not use my influence in any way to secure any particular verdict for or against the proposed union in any church," was the position taken by Rev. G. E. Gilroy, of Brantford, Ont.

Interest centres in the continuation of the debate tonight in the Western Congregational Church, when Rev. Dr. Barton, Boston, and Rev. Dr. D. Glen Atkin, of Detroit, will take part.
