London, June 9.-When the House of Lords reassembled yesterday afternoon, Lord Rosebery arose, and speaking in yesterday atternoon, Lord Rosebery arose, and speaking in reference to the course of business, said that he had received information from influential quarters that in the opinion of those qualified to judge, it would be better if he did not proceed with his resolution for the reform of the second chamber

In his (Lord Rosebery's) judgment that did not apply to his resolutions. It was said that if he pressed his resolutions he would invite reprisals and would provoke those who were not unwilling to be provoked. Nothing could be more unfounded in logic, said his lordship, than any such pretence. Their lordships resolutions had nothing to do with the veto power, and he had no intention of deferring them.
