BOY SCOUTS PASSED ST. JOHN'S EXAMINATIONS

Gold Tie Pin Presented to Mr. W. B. Clark by the Scouts.

The officers of the Boy Scouts were examined in the first aid work of St. John's Ambulance Society in the Armories last night by Mr. F. C. Loveday, and all passed with a high standing in the following order: Gordon Nott, Simpson Parkinson, Ben Ware, J. Harwood, Nellis N. Mann and Harold Nixon.

The class was instructed by Mr. W. B. Clark and at the close of the examination showed their appreciation of his work in their behalf by presenting him with a very handsome gold tie pin suitably engraved. The presentation was made by Ben Ware, and an address was read by Simpson Parkinson. Mr. Clark replied graciously.

Practical Tests.

Quite a number of Boy Scouts were present, and watched with great interest the work done during the examination. The candidates were called upon to attend all sorts of fractures and accidents, and give first aid, as would be done by a physician before the patient was removed to the hospital. Fractured thighs, wounds in the head, broken kneecaps, fractured arms, cases of poisoning, and of suffocation, were all handled, and the officers performed their work with a skill and dispatch that reflected the greatest credit both upon themselves and their instructor.

Are Now Instructors.

Those who were successful last night will in turn become instructors for the other Boy Scouts. The corps is in charge of Lieut. G. N. Weekes, who was present at the examination last night, and was greatly pleased with the results. He will take the scouts to Port Stanley shortly, where they will go into camp for eight days.

Another camp for training purposes will be held at Hyde Park in August, and all boys between the ages of 10 and 18 are invited to attend.

Yesterday afternoon the Scouts had a drill on the Cove rifle ranges, and practiced signalling and first-aid work. The officers who qualified in first-aid work last night are the first members of any of the Boy Scouts in Canada to do so.

MEXICO AGAIN SELECTS DIAZ

An Eighth Term For the Aged President of Republic.

New York, June 28.—A dispatch to the Herald from El Paso, Texas, says: "Porfirio Diaz, the 80-year-old statesman, who has been president of Mexico continuously for twenty-six years, was re-elected to that office today. Senator Ramon Corral undoubtedly was chosen to succeed himself as vice-president. The result means that the policies of President Diaz will continue another six years, at least as long as the veteran ruler lives."

Returns of the voting necessarily are meagre. Mexican processes are slow, and anything like comprehensive figures from the various states on the balloting will not be available for days, but enough is known to make it certain that President Diaz was victorious by a very large margin. Rain in the border states, where there was the greatest danger of trouble, weakened the ardor of the opposition. The fight in Sonora against the administration is reported very quiet compared with what the radical papers had promised it would be. Further discouragement to anti-revolutionists was found in the fact that their nominee for president, Senor Francisco Madero, spent election day in the Monterey prison, and that many of the active leaders of the opposition propaganda also were in custody and under guard of federal troops.

MRS. MORSE GETS \$85,000

Will Spend Entire Amount in Effort To Aid Husband.

New York, June 28.—The sale of the Morse properties which has been in progress in Mrs. Charles W. Morse's residence, was completed this afternoon when Augustus W. Clarke knocked down a lot of nondescript modern books at 12½ cents a volume. The total realized by the sale is approximately \$85,000, which Mrs. Morse intends to use in her endeavor to commute her husband's prison sentence.

A pearl ring with rubies, for which Mrs. Morse paid \$5,000 recently in Paris, was sold for \$2,600 on Saturday, after having been previously sold for \$2,800. The first buyer found that he was unable to present the required 50 per cent deposit.

One jeweller said that the ring was as valuable now as when Mrs. Morse bought it, and that the small price was due entirely to the fact that there was no one there with enough ready cash to pay the necessary deposit for a bid higher than that which bought it.

CHRISTIANS SHOULD BE CHEERFUL PEOPLE

So Said President of W. C. T. U. at Meeting Yesterday.

The local Woman's Christian Temperance Union held its regular session in the lecture hall of the public library Tuesday. The president, Mrs. H. Ashplant, occupied the chair, and led the devotions. She urged that Christians ought to be cheerful people, as they, above all others, had reason to rejoice.

The minutes read, it was decided to drop the last meeting in July and first in August, and it is hoped this will induce every member to attend that of Aug. 23, which is important, as matters regarding their work at the Western Fair will be discussed.

The quarterly reports from the various superintendents of departments were very interesting, showing much good work accomplished.

Mrs. Wallace had visited the women prisoners in the jail, distributed papers, and talked with the inmates; it is seed sown, but the harvest is not apparent, though it is comforting to know that one reclaimed is the winning of an inestimable treasure.

Mrs. R. J. Webster reported for sailors and lumbermen's missions. To Mrs. Capt. McLeod, Owen Sound, she had been given the pleasure of sending six comfort bags. These were each furnished with useful articles, and distributed among them were 90 leaflets, 40 papers and magazines and 6 marked Testaments. The bags, with their contents, are greatly appreciated by the sailors, and the added self-respect arising from the knowledge that they are thus cared for has produced a marked improvement in their conduct.

The press superintendent had sent 28 reports of meetings to the city papers, and the superintendent of work among Africans had distributed 141 papers. Mrs. Webster, of the Flower Mission, had paid five visits to the hospital and six to outside sick people, distributed 30 bouquets, 156 papers and 8 text cards.

Mrs. Plewes, literature superintendent, had distributed 312 papers. People often ask, "What is the W. C. T. U. doing anyway?" This is a small portion of what they have accomplished the past three months, all tending for the improvement of the citizens and nation.
