> [Canadian Press.] LONDON, Oct. 13.—9:35 p.m.—The headquarters of the Belgian Government were today transferred to Havre. With the exception of King Albert, who remains as head of the army, the Minister of War, the members of the cabin-

et, with the other Government officials and the diplomatic corps left Ostend by steamer for the French port, where they will carry on the affairs of state and where hospitality will be offered them by the French. This is the third move of the Belgian capital since the Germans succeede in silencing the forts of Liege. The Government first moved from Brussels to Antwerp; thence to Ostend and today across the line to Havre. This final change followed quickly upon the German westward advance

which was begun immediately on the fall of Antwerp. Their success in taking the chief port of Belgium was the commencement of a new plan of campaign which embraces the occupation of the whole of Belgium, including the coast towns and possibly some of the northern French ports. Beigian Army Reorganized.

In accordance with this new plan the German invaders have begun to sweep across northern Belgium, and yesterday morning occupied Ghent without opposition and are now said to be well advanced toward Bruges on their way Ostend. They will probably meet with strong opposition before they reach Bruges, as the Belgian army is now being reorganized and has been reinforced All dispatches from that region are being strictly censored, so that nothing

"The other enveloping movement on the part of the Germans, undertaken in much greater numerical strength. was directed toward crossing the Meuse in the region of St. Mihiel. If the Germans succeeded in reaching this river on the front between Maizev and Chauvoncourt, all their efforts to advance further resulted in failure. These German forces found themselves caught on the flank by detachments of our troops, which advanced from the south to the north through the southern section of the heights of the Meuse and through the northern section of the
