

LIQUOR'S EFFECT OF LITTLE WEIGHT

Saskatchewan Premier Tells
Delegation That Signers
Withdraw Names.

CLERGYMEN ON THE LIST
But Imposing Array of Fig-
ures Nullified by Informa-
tion Received.

Regina, Sask., June 2.—The executive of the Saskatchewan Licensed Victuallers' Association yesterday waited on the Government armed with a petition containing some 53,000 names, praying that the Government would submit its temperance proposals to the people. Practically all the members of the House were present, and the delegation was received by Premier Scott and Hon. George Bell.

Secretary Scott of the association pointed out that the association believed that the general public in the province was not in favor of the drastic temperance reform now contemplated. Included among the signatures were the names of 41 clergymen.

The Premier, in replying, admitted that under ordinary circumstances the presentation of a petition of such magnitude would be a serious thing. He had, however, received a great deal of correspondence from people who had signed the petition asking that their names might be considered cancelled. They alleged in some cases that there had been misrepresentation. Others stated that they had signed in order to get rid of the canvassers. Moreover, in certain districts in which the licensed victuallers had worked, the temperance forces had followed with another petition supporting the Government in their policy, and 25 per cent of the signatures appearing on the liquor men's petition also appeared on the other.

Government is Firm.
In view of all the arguments which had been made against the measure, which the signatures to the petition of the licensed victuallers had been procured, and in view also of the hearty approval which had come from all parts of the province from all classes of men and women, the Government was convinced that the petition presented by the executive had been obtained fairly and truly indicated the feeling throughout the province, then there would be nothing for the present Government to do but to step down and allow someone else to carry out the policy which the liquor men desired.

German General Taken by Russians

Von Privitz Reported Captured at
Lubau With Other Officers.

Petrograd, June 2.—The newspapers published in the Baltic Provinces are unanimous in the statement that a Russian patrol has captured Gen. Von Privitz, the commander of the German forces at Lubau, together with several other German officers. The patrol had an encounter with the general's escort. Some were killed, and the remainder also were taken prisoner. Gen. Von Privitz was slightly wounded on the head.

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ITALIANS INFLECT DEFEAT ON ENEMY

Official Statement From
Rome Tells of Series of
Engagements.

PLENTY OF VOLUNTEERS
Two Hundred Thousand Ac-
cepted, and No More
Wanted Yet.

Rome, June 2.—The following statement was issued today at the headquarters of the general staff of the Italian army:

"A series of engagements fought on May 30 in Carniola, west of Montenegro, ended in the defeat of the enemy, who left 30 dead and numerous wounded in front of our lines.

"During the 31st there were small actions all along the frontier as the result of a new disposition of our advanced troops. The bad weather, which continues to create serious difficulties, was not in favor of the drastic temperance reform now contemplated. Included among the signatures were the names of 41 clergymen.

"Ancona authorities state that the damage to the railroad bridge over the Marosca, near Rimini, on May 24, was not caused by enemy warships, but by an Austrian dirigible, which was flying the Italian flag.

BOMBED MOLFFETTA, TOO.

PLENTY OF VOLUNTEERS.

DUKE AS PRIVATE.

Rome, via Paris, June 2.—The Duke of Apulia, who is 18 years old, has, with the permission of King Victor Emmanuel, enlisted as a private in the artillery and departed for the front.

PRINCE OF SERBIA.

Paris, June 2.—A Rome dispatch to the Matin says Prince Teano, a former deputy, and son of the Duke of Sermoneta, at one time Italian foreign minister, has joined the Socialist-Reformist party.

Marseilles, France, June 2.—Lieut. Decasse, commanding the 3rd Zouaves at Constantine, Algeria, has appointed King Victor Emmanuel of Italy his second corporal in the first section of his company, a rank which the King's grandfather was given on the night of the battle of Palestro.

COUNTRY MEMBERS GIVE GENEROUSLY

General Assembly Reports
Will Show Some Falling
Off in Cities.

Kingston, June 2.—The opening meeting of the Forty-first General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be held in Grant Hall, Queen's University, tonight. A larger attendance than last year is predicted. Rev. Dr. W. R. Herdridge, of Ottawa, retiring moderator, will preach tonight, and a new moderator will be elected. The nominations will be made for this office, including Rev. Dr. J. Neil, Toronto; Rev. Dr. M. Magillivray, Kingston; Rev. Dr. D. D. McLean, Barrie; Rev. Dr. A. B. Baird, Winnipeg, and Rev. Dr. A. J. Scrimger, of Montreal.

During the week, the business reports have been presented at the sessions, and special reports in the evening. The financial report will make about the same showing as last year. Although the amount raised in city districts is said to be less, the country country districts have given more liberally.

Church union will be one of the important questions discussed by the assembly. About one hundred delegates arrived this morning. The attendance will be about six hundred.

"A COMRADE IN WHITE
IS SEEN BENDING OVER
WOUNDED AMID BATTLE"

Mystical Tale From Trenches Appears in Scottish Magazine
—The Story Told by George Casey of "Another
Who Was Wounded."

This mystical tale from the trenches is taken from Life and Work, the Church of Scotland magazine. No writer's name is given.

The Friend of the Wounded.

"Strange tales reached us in the trenches. Rumors raced up and down that 300-mile line from Switzerland to the sea. We knew neither the source of them nor the truth of them. They came quickly, and they went quickly. Yet somehow I remember the very hour when George Casey turned to me with a queer look in his blue eyes, and asked if I had seen the Friend of the Wounded.

"And then he told me all he knew. After many a hot engagement a man in white had been seen bending over the wounded. Snipers sniped at him. Shells fell all around. Nothing had power to touch him. He was either heroic beyond all heroes, or he was something greater still. This mysterious one, whom the French called the Comrade in White, seemed to be everywhere at once. At Nancy, in the Argonne, at Soissons and Ypres, everywhere men were talking of him with hushed voices.

"But some laughed and said the trenches were telling on men's nerves. I, who was often reckless enough in my talk, exclaimed that for me seeing was believing, and that I didn't expect any help but a German knife if I was found lying out there wounded.

"I Was Shot."

"It was the next day that things got lively on this bit of the front. Our big guns roared from sunrise to sunset, and began again in the morning. At noon the word was taken to the trenches in front of us. They were 200 yards away. And we weren't well started till we knew that the big guns had fallen silent. It was a word of preparation, a word of warning, a word of death.

"And while he swiftly moved every trace of blood and mire I felt as if my whole nature were being washed, as if all the dirt and grime of the world were going, and as if I were once more a little child.

"He, Too, Had Been Wounded."

"I suppose I slept, for when I awoke this feeling was gone. I was a man, and I wanted to know what I could do for my friend to help him to serve him. He was looking towards the stream, and his hands were clasped in prayer.
