

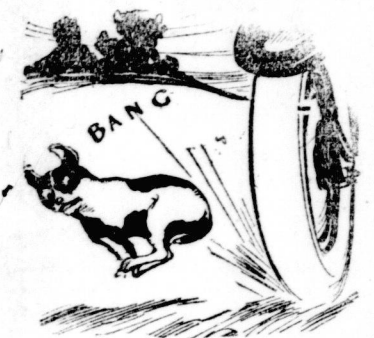

Obituary
PIONEER OF 92 DIES.
One of the oldest residents of this
locality was the late Samuel Hambly,
who had resided in this part of the
country for the past 40 years. Half
of that time was spent in farming in
the township of Westminster, but about
20 years ago he sold his farm and
retired to Dorchester Station, where he
lived until about two years ago, when
he and Mrs. Hambly removed to the
city, intending to remain there, but
the love for Canada and the old friends
in Ontario was still strong, and they
decided to return to the old home once
more. They were spending the summer
with another son, Dr. Scott B. Hambly
of Detroit, at his summer residence at
Walnut Lake en route, when Mr. Hambly
was taken ill, and died on June 6 at the
age of 92. Interment took place in the
family plot at the Union Cemetery,
Dorchester, where the service at the
grave was conducted by Rev. S. J.
Thompson, Methodist minister of the
church where Mr. Hambly had been a
devoted member during his twenty
years' residence there and where he
was always ready to give a helping
hand when his services were required.
Mr. Hambly is survived by his wife,
two daughters, Miss Edith of London
and Mrs. F. H. MacKenzie of Regina,
Sask., and two sons, Dr. Scott B.
Hambly of Detroit, and R. S. (Clair)
of Chicago.

SPRINGBANK PICNICS

Thousands of Londoners and West-
Ontario residents spent Dominion
Day at Springbank Park. A large ma-
jority of them attended the several
large picnics that were staged there.
From early morning until late at night
street cars were constantly busy con-
veying the picnickers to and from the
grounds, while hundreds of autos of
non-residents of the city filled the park
drives.

Among the large picnics were the
Canadian Express Employees' annual
picnic, King Street Presbyterian
Church, the Southern Congregational

Sunday School, Chalmers Presbyterian
Church and two young people's clubs
