BOLDUC RANKS AS OLDEST SENATOR

Appointed by MacDonald Ministry in 1884, Has Been Speaker Since 1916.

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—(Canadian Press)—Hon. J. Bolduc, speaker of the senate since June 3, 1916, is the oldest member of the senate in point of seniority.
Senator Bolduc was appointed by the MacDonald ministry in 1884.
In view of the interesting circumstances of the senate majority being against the government in the next parliament, the party affiliations of the members of the upper chamber, as given by themselves, is also of interest at this time.
Only four senators remain in the upper house who were appointed by the MacDonald (Conservative) ministry previous to 1916. They are Senators Bolduc, Polner, Sir James Loughheed and Montplaisir.
There are 25 members of the senate who were appointed by the Laurier administration, 30 appointed by the Borden government and 14 appointed by Premier Meighen.
There is at present one vacancy, caused by the death of Hon. T. W. Crothers last week. It is expected that this will be filled either before the opening of the next parliament or shortly afterwards. Of the appointees of the Union government, senator J. G. Turfitt, has since espoused the cause of the National Progressives, and is their lone representative in the upper chamber.

SENATOR CROTHERS BURIED IN HOME CITY

St. Thomas, Dec. 13.—The remains of Senator T. W. Crothers, who died at Ottawa on Saturday, arrived here at noon today and were at once taken to First Methodist Church, where they were viewed by many of his old friends and former constituents. Later an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Warner, principal emeritus of Alma College, and Rev. Wilfred F. Gaetz, pastor of the church.
The flower-bedecked casket was borne to the grave by Hon. Flinlay G. M. McDonald, formerly minister of public works; W. Jackson, ex-M. P., West Elgin; Hugh C. McKillop, M. P., West Elgin; Samuel Price, chairman Westerners' compensation board; Dr. F. H. Coyne, W. K. Cameron, K.C., K. W. McKay and R. M. Anderson.
The remains were accompanied here by Mrs. Crothers and other relatives from Ottawa and Kingston.

TEN LIVES LOST IN RAIL WRECKS DUE TO RAIN

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 13.—Torrential rains, which in the last two days have caused landslides and railroad accidents that took a toll of ten lives, and did heavy property damage, ceased early today.

Fears were expressed, however, that flood waters from melting snow would do further damage.

VETERANS TO QUIZ VIEWS OF LIBERAL CHIEF

Deputation To Present Questionnaire On Soldiers' Problems To Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King.

HEADED BY RAYFIELD, V.C.

Will Ask That Employment Be Found For Pensioners Unable To Do Hard Work.

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—A deputation, consisting of Sgt. W. L. Rayfield, V.C., vice-president; J. F. Marsh, secretary, and Major F. O. G. Wood, treasurer, of the Dominion Command, Great Army United Veterans of Canada, arrived in Ottawa yesterday to present a questionnaire to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier-elect, to ascertain his views on returning soldier problems. The deputation hopes to present the questionnaire today. These same questions were asked Hon. Mackenzie King, Premier Arthur Meighen and Hon. T. A. Crerar previous to the election, but Mr. King's stand, while favoring reforms in the present system, did not meet each question separately. The questions are as follows:

1. Re-establishment by the payment of a re-establishment bonus based on length of service.
2. Pensions on a basis of one dollar per month for each per cent disability.
3. Pensions to the widows and orphans sufficient to enable them to live up to the Canadian standard of living.
4. Pensions to parents of deceased ex-service men and women.
5. The equivalent to one year's pension to be paid at the death of pensioners to compensate those who have assumed the responsibility for sickness and funeral expenses.
6. Preference to ex-service men in appointments to civil service, to be made permanent after six months' satisfactory service.
7. Insurance against sickness and unemployment.
8. Restriction against immigration and rigid exclusion of all Asiatics and enemy aliens.
9. Find Government Employment.
10. The erection and maintenance by the federal government of homes for aged and indigent veterans.
11. Appropriation of all exchange losses incurred by ex-service men and women.
12. Employment to be found in government service for all pensioners unable to undertake hard work.
13. That all ex-service men and women who have received gratuity in lieu of pension be entitled to reboard on application.

The deceased was crossing the intersection of Wyandotte and Mercer streets, in company with two friends, when the mishap occurred.

WOMEN PICKETS STOP COAL MINERS IN KANSAS

Pittsburgh, Kan., Dec. 13.—The militant women pickets of the Kansas coal fields went into action again before daylight today and stopped miners from working at three mines of the Central Coal and Coke Company. Several miners were wounded in melee and several persons were injured.

CLAIMS RADEK ON WAY TO BERLIN CONFERENCE

Berlin, Dec. 13.—Rumors that Karl Radek is on his way to Berlin for the purpose of negotiating with Hugo Stinnes in regard to reconstruction work in Russia are emphatically denied by those close to the German magnate.
It is pointed out that M. Radek is the Soviet chief of propaganda, and is purely political agent, would hardly be one with whom Herr Stinnes and his fellow-financiers would deal.

BANDITS TAKE \$13,000 FROM MICHIGAN BANK

Mount Clemens, Mich., Dec. 13.—Two armed bandits today held up the Half Way State Bank at Half Way, near here, and escaped with a sum estimated at \$13,000. The bandits fled in an automobile, heading for Detroit.

Millions of Bushels of Grain Received At Buffalo

Nearly a quarter of a billion bushels of grain have been received by lake and rail thus far this season, indicating a high record for ten years, and one of the heaviest movements of grain in the history of the port. Every elevator on the waterfront is full, and 54 freighters are moored in the outer harbor with 23,000,000 bushels of grain in their holds. Some of the grain afloat will be moved on to the sea-board by rail before the harbor freezes, but much will be held aboard until spring.

Official tonnage figures for the year will not be available until the close of next week, but statistics available at the corn exchange and estimates by elevator owners and grain shippers indicate that the quarter billion mark will be reached and possibly passed.

OTTAWA MAN FACES CHARGE OF EMBEZZLING

Finance Dept. Employee Is Alleged To Have Defrauded Canadian Government.

\$33,000 TOTAL INVOLVED

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—C. J. Artz, employee of the finance department who was charged in police court today with embezzlement of \$33,000 belonging to the Government of Canada, has made a complete confession to the authorities, according to a statement made by Superintendent Walter Duncan of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who is at present in charge of the prosecution.
Superintendent Duncan states that Artz had admitted he commenced his young woman in the same department as far as criminal proceedings are concerned, but she is no longer in the employ of the government.
It has been ascertained that Artz cashed both cancelled and uncanceled Victory Bond coupons. In connection with the former, which are cancelled by the New York bank, it is disclosed by the New York bank, that the fact they had been cancelled by fastening a number of the cancelled coupons (about 300) in a paper fastener placed in the cancelled hole, and then presenting them again to the banks for payment.
Asked if there were further arrests pending and whether any bank officials would be involved, in forthcoming disclosures, Superintendent Duncan stated he preferred to await the trial of Artz, a week hence, when the story would unfold itself.

MASSONS PREDICT BUILDING BOOM

8,000 apprentices at the present moment there were only 3,000.
Discuss Apprentices.
He suggested to the convention that every member be allotted two apprentices and that they be transferred when their respective employers can not utilize them to those that can, all such time as their employer may find work for them.
Of particular interest to the convention was the report of the secretary, W. T. McGarvey, of Cincinnati. He summarized for the convention the problems confronting the delegates.
In his report Mr. McGarvey said: "The world's needs of today are just as great as those before the war, and perhaps greater, but industry and commerce lag, is this because of international exchange, because of taxation or because of a lack of that spirit of co-operation which is always essential for the higher attainments of mankind?"
Outline Conditions.
Mr. McGarvey then sketched for the delegates the conditions he found in the various cities which had reported to him, and the progress of the Association. The reports were of an optimistic tone and conditions generally favorable.
Reverting to the problems which he wished to draw to the attention of the delegates, Mr. McGarvey said:
"Now that the time of falling prices and industrial difficulties has come some of the local joint arbitration boards have been passing through troubled waters, by making the journeymen that the world-wide depression was upon us and a continuance of the high wage meant an end to our business. In a great many of our cities the wisdom of the men prompted a reduction of wages, and we believe that refusal was partially the cause of only 72 per cent of building mechanics being employed in 51 cities that reported to us."
Sees Propaganda Need.
Continuing, Mr. McGarvey said a grave matter of importance confronting the industry is the substitution of other materials for brick work. It has been called to my attention that 85 per cent of residential building is being built of other materials than that of brick, which is indicative that our industry is fast slipping away. I believe it is the duty and the work of this international association to institute some sort of procedure or propaganda that will again restore us to our industry.
The secretary noted with pleasure in his report that freight rates in Canada had been reduced and that the wheat crop in the Dominion was great. "It is further generally known this year has been the best that Canada has ever known. The number of buildings erected to date is 14,000 as compared with 11,000 last year, and it is said that no industry has a brighter future in the Dominion than building," says the report.

G. W. V. A. LAUNCHES NEW RELIEF FUND

Opens Drive in Ottawa For \$20,000 To Aid Needy Families.

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—Realizing that they must rely largely on their own efforts to allay the extreme distress which is at present prevailing among such a large number of ex-soldiers' families, the Ottawa branch of the G. W. V. A. this morning launched a drive for at least \$20,000, the money to be used immediately to relieve those who so sorely need a helping hand at this time. The campaign will be known as the "keeping faith fund," and will last for ten days.
Her Excellency Lady Byng, has very kindly given her patronage to the drive. About 400 families of ex-soldiers are being wholly or partially supported by the G. W. V. A. and it is estimated that a daily incident to see the relief secretary handing out from 50 to 100 orders for groceries, as many more orders for fuel, vouchers covering the rent payment, and orders for meals at a local restaurant to single men.

UNABLE TO GIVE CITY CERTIFIED MILK THIS YEAR

Board of Health Activity Restricted On Account of Lateness of Season.

BEST MILK IN HISTORY

The London Board of Health for 1921 will be unable to launch the movement to provide London with a supply of certified milk.

The board is holding its final meeting of the year Tuesday afternoon. It was expected that the federal veterinary for this district, Dr. Farwell, would be present at the meeting and explain the federal scheme of testing all herds and weeding out the re-actors, leaving all herds free of tubercular cattle. However, Dr. C. S. Tamin, the board's veterinary, says that the federal officer has not as yet received permission from his chief to take such action, and it seems that the matter must go over to the new board.

Under the federal scheme, the tubercular afflicted cattle found by the federal officer in a herd are destroyed and the owner is reimbursed. To have this morning launched a drive for at least \$20,000, the money to be used immediately to relieve those who so sorely need a helping hand at this time. The campaign will be known as the "keeping faith fund," and will last for ten days.
