### Conflict Involving Highest Officials Is Seen As Result of Landis' Method of Dealing With Giant Bribery Case

Barney Dreyfuss Hints More New York Players Implicated.

STRIFE LIKELY

Ban Johnson Thought One of Leaders Uniting Against Commissioner.

Associated Press Despatch. Washington, Oct. 3 .- Factional strife involving baseball's highest officials may deal that has thrown the diamond world into turmoil.

Although the day failed to add fresh sensations to the bribery scandal, or point further suspicion to anyone outside the two Giant players banished from the game, there were strong indications that the governing forces of the game were at the point of sharp conflict.

Culminating factors in this situation today were the announcement of Ban Johnson, president of the American League, that he would not attend the series because of the suspicion surrounding the Giants, and a statement by Barney Dreyfuss, Pittsburg club owner, which was viewed here as a challenge to the decision of Landis which placed the guilt for the bribery scheme upon Dolan and O'Connell alone among the Giant players. 
