DAIRY EXPORTS

Canadian Press Despatch.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—The export movement of cheese from the port of Montreal last week was much smaller than the previeus one, as the total shipments only amounted to 36.396 boxes, which shows a decrease of 22.270 boxes as compared with the week ending Nov. 10, but they were 5.747 boxes larger than the same week last year, and the total exports from May 1, 1923, to date have been 79.556 boxes in excess of the corresponding period for 1922.

For the third week this month there were no exports of butter made to Europe, while the shipments for the same week last year were 901 packages. The total exports for the season of 1923 to date have been 71.760 packages, as against 318.144 packages for the same period last year, showing a decrease of 246.248 packages, and an increase of 5.363 packages with 1921.

The movement of eggs for export account last week were considerable less. The total shipments were 11,724 cases, which show a decrease of 11.155 cases as compared with the previous one and a decrease of 8.382 cases with the same week last year, while the total exports for the season to date, were 46.564 cases below that same period of 1922, and 60.540 cases less than 1921.
