DIVERS ENDANGER LIVES HOPING SAVE COMRADES

Unsuccessful in Attempts To Locate Sunken British Submarine.

HEAVY SEAS INTERFERE

Believed Crew Died Quickly When Ship Sank After Collision.

Associated Press Despatch.
Portland, England, Jan. 11.—Divers made a number of unsuccessful descents off Portland Bill this afternoon in an effort to learn whether an object located in 30 fathoms of water is the British submarine L24, which sank yesterday after a collision with the dreadnaught Lethbridge.

The divers were greatly handicapped by huge seas, and made their descents at great personal risk. They will continue to search further tomorrow.

An underwater examination of the Resolution shows unmistakably that the submarine must have been badly holed. The bow chain of the battleship was cut right through, and while the battleship itself was not seriously damaged, there are marks showing that she must have struck the submarine with tremendous force. It is supposed the underwater examination was struck high up, which would explain why no oil floated up, because the oil tanks are at the bottom of the vessel.

The end of the crew is believed to have been mercifully swift, as the sea pouring in on the batteries would have created fumes, asphyxiating the men almost immediately. This is regarded as the likely happening, since the sensitive hydrophones have heard no sounds.

Members of the Resolution's crew, it was learned today, just before the accident saw what they supposed was a dummy torpedo just ahead, but what, it is now known, must have been the submarine's periscope.

FORKE NOT BOUND BY CREAR MOVE

Declares He Will Not Recognize Promises of Former Leader.

U. F. M. IS ORGANIZED

Winnipeg, Jan. 11.—A provincial co-ordinating committee, which will work in close co-operation with similar committees in the other provinces with the aim of completing a national organization, was appointed at a conference of Manitoba Progressives here today. The conference was attended by Robert Forke, M.P., party leader.

An official statement handed out tonight says: "Strong adherence to the principles for which the Progressives stand was the keynote of the conference. There was a unanimous sentiment that the Progressive organization must embrace all who desire to see these principles accepted as governing principles of our national life."

Robert Forke announced that a definite decision had been made to effect a reorganization of the party in this province. He added that the party would not recognize Hon. T. A. Crear's conference in Ottawa with Premier King nor be bound by any decision reached there.

In addressing the conference, Mr. Forke said that there is no reason for excitement or confusion over the Crear-King negotiations.

LABOR CONSIDERS SPEAKERS' PLAN

Opposition From the Tories Is Thought Unlikely in View of Situation.

London, Jan. 11.—If the Labor leaders, in order to get over the lack of Labor spokesmen in the House of Lords, adopt the suggestion which Lord Birkenhead made in his recent proposals for a full circle, the Labor party is considering the matter.

This naturally would require legislation, but a short bill introduced at the earliest possible date by the Labor government might encounter less opposition than would be imagined. The Liberals probably are prepared to accord it ready support, while the crusty Tories, dreading the apparition of peers in corduroys and hob-nailed boots looting upon the red benches of the Lords, might accept it with as much grace as possible for fear of something more dreadful befalling the chamber otherwise.

HEALTH OF FIELDING IS MUCH IMPROVED

Receives a Few Visitors and Dictates Letters At His Home.

Ottawa, Jan. 11.—Right Hon. W. S. Fielding is so much improved in health that he would be able to move about his home without assistance were it not for his eye trouble. This information was furnished by his physician tonight when he was asked about the minister's condition. It is stated that Mr. Fielding receives a few visitors, dictates letters and shows his usual keen interest in the progress of public affairs.

NEW GRECIAN PREMIER INVENTED SPECIAL GUN

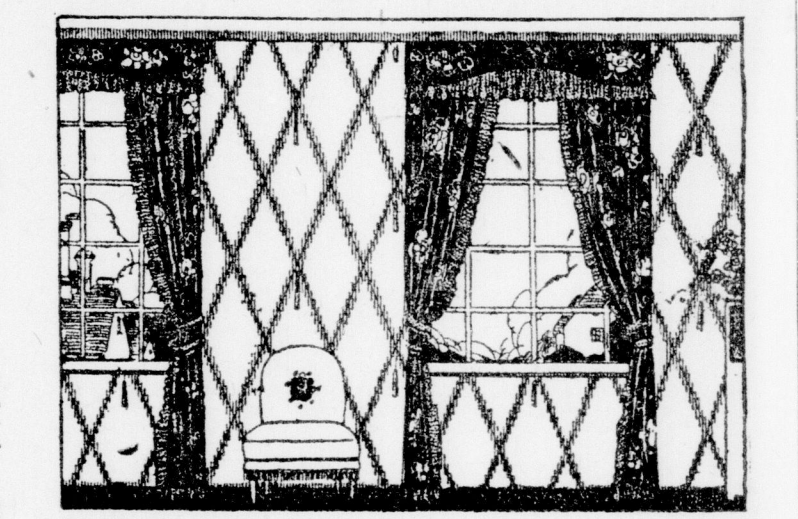

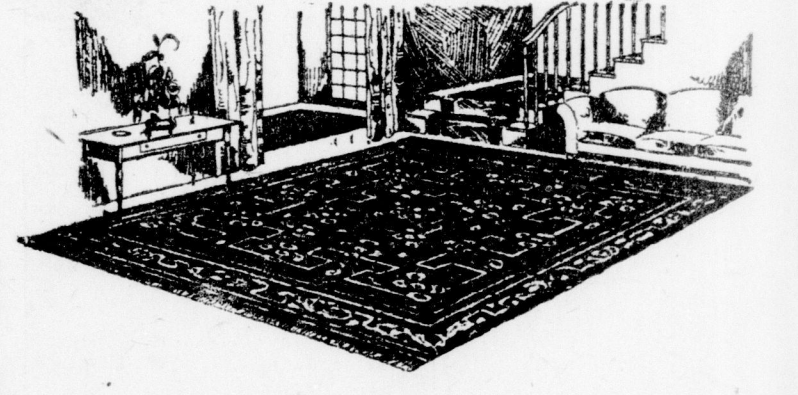
