London Markets.

London, Thursday, April 7, 1887.

There was an active market today, and a fair representation of all kinds of produce.

Grain deliveries were limited, and if anything prices were higher. The best for No. 1, one wheat was \$1.10 per bushel, and the best for No. 2, one wheat was \$1.05 per bushel.

Oats remained at 92 to 95 cents per bushel. A few loads of rye sold at 80 cents for feed purposes and 85 for sowing.

The meat supply was ample and the quality superior, and some of the best, veal and lamb would do credit to any market in the world.

Mr. A. H. Smith, in the outside market, offered a head of steers and better of the finest quality and realized \$4 per cwt. for fat, and a head of steers and better of the finest quality and realized \$4 per cwt. for fat.

There was some superior veal for Easter, and Mr. Dodson, butcher of Dundas street, secured a calf 11 months old that dressed 550 lbs. of veal. Such an article is what prime veal should be to have the autumn properties of meat.

Spring lambs were scarce and prices high, and \$4 to \$5 were paid for lambs dressing 25 lbs. A low quality of veal could be bought at 4 cents a pound, and the carcass, and the best quality sold at 7 to 9 cents a pound.

Pork was easy, at \$6 to \$6 1/2 per cwt. Better best firm, at \$2 to \$2 1/2 cents a pound for single roasts, and 18 to 20 for large roasts.

Lugs were firm, at 13 to 14 cents a dozen. The poultry supply was ample, and very little demand. Good turkeys sold at 11 to 12 cents a pound, and chickens from 6 to 7 cents a pair.

Potatoes were put first at \$1 to \$1 1/2 a bag. Apples at car quotations.

Vegetables generally at our table prices. Hay in fair demand, at \$10 to \$11 a ton.
