ENRAGE. — The following is official:

BERLIN, Aug. 18.—The following is official: Pont Mossen, Wednesday Evening.—Gen. Alvensloen advanced yesterday with the Third corps towards the East side of Metz on the line of the enemy's retreat towards Verdun. He encountered severe fighting with a division of Troisfontaine, Cambrai and the Imperial Guard, which was sustained successfully by the French and a part of the Ninth corps under Prince Frederick Charles.

A severe combat ensued lasting 12 hours, losses on both sides heavy.

The Prussian Generals Doering and Wiedt were killed. Rousach and Grascher wounded.

Notwithstanding the superiority of the French force they were driven in upon Metz.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The World's London special says of the continual reports of engagements that they were a series of conflicts necessarily entailed upon the two armies by reason of their vast numbers and extension of line on which they are moving.

The Prussians will doubtless leave Verdun beyond them as they have left Metz. On

the 18th, Bente, Strasbourg and other fortified places.

It is believed on best authority that the French will concentrate at Chalons with six hundred thousand men and one thousand guns, and that the Prussians will attack them with five hundred thousand men and two hundred guns, giving us 1,100,000.

There are rumors of agitation among the Germans of the Baltic Russia, and of the mobilization of the Russian army for the Prussian frontier.

Everything now depends upon the result of Gen. Bazaine's battle near Chalons.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—In the different battles around Metz 40,000 French troops of the 2nd and 20th corps were engaged. The Prussian loss is computed at 20,000. The French loss was comparatively small, and owing to the aid afforded by cannon and the adjoining fortress.

Official dispatches from Marshal Bazaine just received, claim a great victory over Prince Frederick Charles and General Steinmetz, between Thionville and Thionville.

The Times to-day says Emile Olivier, ex-prime Minister, has gone to Italy. His departure at such a moment is severely commented on.

Information received this morning reports a great battle going on near Metz, a place about one-third of the way on the road from Metz to Verdun. Large numbers are reported killed on both sides. No particular yet received. Generals Troisfontaine and Beauvilliers reported wounded.

Information of a reliable character has just been received to the effect that a large body of Prussians had entered Bapaume in the Department of Meuse.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The Times says the French were fighting their way all Tuesday to gain a position which would enable them to turn the enemy's right flank, and their progress was necessarily slow. On Tuesday night they had advanced no further than a point near Stoe, 15 miles from Metz. These are the only facts positively known.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—La Presse says that two days ago a French war vessel captured in the English Channel a British vessel laden with contraband of war, destined for the Prussians.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—A private cable dispatch says Bazaine declared that the enemy were repelled along the whole line, while German official reports claim a victory on the ground that the French were prevented from continuing their retreat.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The following is official—Gen. Froident is reported gravely wounded in one of the recent battles in the vicinity of Metz.

BERLIN, via LONDON, Aug. 18.—In a naval engagement in the Baltic yesterday, one division of the Prussian fleet, consisting of an avisos and the gunboats Drache, Blitz and Seeadler, encountered a French fleet of four armed frigates, a corvette and a sloop. The Prussians soon withdrew with loss.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The French Government represents the previous reverses of the army as fully checked and says that the attempt of the enemy to interfere with the concentration of troops at Chalons has been completely frustrated.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The Paris account of the battle at Metz on Monday says Bazaine was not surprised, and succeeded in effecting a junction with McMahon and Troisfontaine.

The London Times, in an article on the situation, says the road to Paris is open to the Crown Prince, who may leave Charles Frederick to watch Mar-

shal Bazaine.

The Times' special telegram from Berlin this morning contains the following: The French army has been separated by the victory of the Prussians at Mars-la-Tour. The main body has been forced back on Metz and brought to a stand by the 1st and 2nd German armadas under Prince Frederick Charles and General Steinmetz. The road is now open to Chalons for the Crown Prince who has only General Troyer and some fragments of McMahon's corps to encounter on the way to Paris.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The Paris journals this morning say that 19 Prussian spies were arrested and after trial and condemnation by court-martial were shot at Fort de Malstromgarde. Among the executed were five officers of the enemy.

The following has just been made public: General Headquarters, 1:35 p.m.—On the march the corps of General Liedtke must form on the extreme right of the army division of the 73rd regiment, destroyed the Prussian regiment of lancers and took its colors.

There have been many brilliant charges, one of which General Legrand was killed at the head of his division. General Montague is missing. Prussian Generals Keeling and Wezel were

killed and Generals Tramont and Von Ramek were wounded. Prince Albert, of the Prussians, commanding the cavalry, was killed the following morning. We are masters of the position previously held by the enemy. On the morning of the 17th several combats with the rear guard took place near Gavrelotte. The force of the enemy is the battle of the 16th is estimated at 150,000. We have not yet received exact figures of our losses.

PARIS, Aug. 19.—The authorities continue to arrest suspicious parties. Many discoveries have been made of arms and paper demonstration widely extended system of Prussian spying throughout France, and means of besieging new French cities are being prepared.
