ST. ANDREW'S CATHEDRAL

Imposing Dedication and Consecration Services to be Held To-day.

A Building of the Gothic School-The Only One of the Class on the Coast.

Brief and Interesting History of the R. C. Community in this Diocese.

On Sunday, October 5, 1890, the founda tion stone of St. Andrew's R. C. Cathedral was well and truly laid: on Sunday, October 30,1892 (to-day), the building will be consecrated and dedicated to the worship of

Though impressive the first ceremony, the second will be more so, and, should the weather prove auspicious, there will be a gathering within the sacred precincts of the new Cathedral which will fittingly mark the progress of the church in this diocese and bespeak for it a bright and prosperous future.

The history of the R. C. Church in this city is brief but interesting. From small beginnings great things have been accommodified from Mr. plished.
