During sho their absence they visited several places which the Germans did not go, but they encountered no opposition. They learned that some twelve Europeans, mostly Swedish and Nerwegian missionaries, besides Gen. Watts Jones, were sides massacred at Kwei Hua Cheng, by orders of the Taotai, and that one hundred native Christians had also been put to death. The details of the outrages are Captains Wingate and Ryder visited

Captains Wingate and Ryder visited the Belgian station, where the priests in charge and 3,000 converts had sustained a prolonged siege by Boxers and imperial troops. They were informed that other stations further west are besieged not only by Boxers, but by Chinese troops, acting under orders from the authorities, and that in spite of the assurances by the plenipotentiaries, that the government is doing its utmost to suppress outrages. Chinese carrying concealed weapons are arrested daily in Perkin. Natives allege that December 19 has
