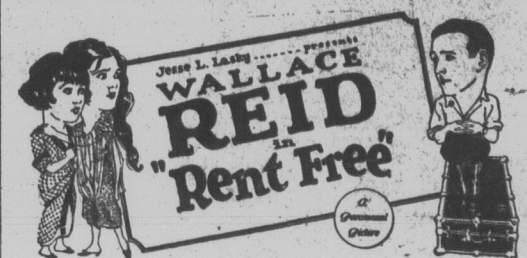
was of blue tulle with hat to match.
