RETURNING PROSPERITY.

Canada's revenue for the last nine

months from all sources, customs, excise

and miscellaneous, is reported as

\$22,572,724 greater than during the

same period in 1921. A growth

revenue and a decrease in the national

railway operating deficit are encouraging

results of the first year of Liberal

rule. Such signs of returning nor-

malcy are indeed calculated to in-

spire confidence that the day is fast

coming when it will be possible to

balance revenue and expenditure and

gradually to reduce the national debt.

That can be accomplished only when,

in every department of public service,

there is practised the strictest econ-

omy consistent with efficient and pro-

gressive business methods, and if

every effort is made to encourage

trade and the settlement of the

country by those who will aid in

the development of its agricultural and

industrial resources.

Although prosperity is evidently re-

turning, Canada has numerous prob-

lems to face at this time. And their

satisfactory solution will very largely

depend upon the success which attends

the national effort to increase the popu-

lation of the dominion. It would

seem that the policy which gave the

United States over one hundred mil-

lions of people is a policy which Can-

ada would be wise to follow, for a time

at least.
