It is reported that a number of persons who, following the crop failure of 1914, received substantial assistance from the Dominion Government, by way of seed grain, fodder, and relief, are endeavouring to evade their responsibility and are not attempting to pay their indebtedness, even though they have good crops and are financially able, preferring to pay the low rate of interest—5 per cent—which was charged by the Government on these advances, and using the ready money for other purposes. The collection staff of the Department of the Interior is visiting districts where it is reasonable to expect that collection may be effected without undue hardship, and these collections are being furnished with instructions to collect. If necessary, by seizure, where they are convinced that those indebted are endeavouring to evade their responsibility, although financially able to pay.

Army pay of Canadian soldiers overseas is exempted from British taxation, but private incomes over \$600 a year, accruing to the wives of these soldiers from any source whatever in Canada are taxed. The British tax is levied on the smallest taxable income upwards to 25 per cent. Numerous protests have been made, but so far the tax stands.
