Home and kept from yielding to the old temptations for upwards of two years.

In the Protestant Hospital is a poor girl whose life is fast ebbing away because of past dissipation. When the first symptoms of disease appeared she fled for refuge to the Home, and at the close of one of the gospel meetings was asked a pointed question about her soul's welfare. As she evidently did not wish anyone to mention the subject to her, she fled to her own room and securely fastened the door, but she could not shut out the question—it seemed to echo and re-echo in her ears—"How shall you escape if you neglect so great a salvation?"

The Spirit of God soon workeddeep and real conviction and she was led to cry for pardon and mercy; for hours she seemed unable to get a sense of His forgiveness, until, on opening an old Bible, she read, "Neither do I condemn thee, go and sin no more."

Such testimonies, and these are not exceptional cases, serve to show something of the good that is being accomplished in the hearts and lives of the inmates, and not until the secrets of all hearts are revealed will it be fully known how many have been led to realize God's forgiving love.
