180,090 lath.

THE sheriff is in possession of the premises

seized.

Mercantile Summary.

Columbia River, has closed. Correct footings
give the total pack on the river for the year at
375,000 cases, a shortage of 60,000 cases on the
pack of 1890.

THERE is a lawsuit pending in Vancouver
which involves the interests of that city, the
Vancouver Electric Light and Street Railway
Co. and the Westminster and Vancouver Elec-
tric Tramway Co. In Chambers on the 12th
instant, the matter was enlarged for one week
to allow the interested parties an opportunity
to settle their differences out of court.

MCINTYRE & BENZIER, speculative builders in
Toronto, have become insolvent, and it is said
they have abandoned their estate. It appears
that the little capital the firm possessed be-
came locked up in the time of the boom. This,
added to severe competition, made it necessary
for them to assign. They owe about \$3,200,
and have nominal assets slightly in excess of
this sum.

QUITE an extensive business was done by
S. S. Young, wholesale grocer at Trenton, for
a small town, but a good deal of it must have
been among small customers. Mr. Young has
been in business about ten years, and it was
thought at one time that his affairs were in
good shape. Lately, however, he has been
rather slow in making payments, and now he
has found a suspension necessary.
