14.2 Current Obligations

Parliament placed a number of statutory obligations on the CSIS and the Security Offences Act. The CSIS must table its annual report before each House of Parliament within 90 days of the end of the fiscal year. This has drawn parliamentary and public attention to the activities of the CSIS.

Finally, section 36 of the CSIS Act and section 7 of the Security Offences Act require Parliament to establish a committee for the purpose of carrying out a comprehensive review of the provisions and operation of the CSIS Act and the Security Offences Act and to report on that review to Parliament.
