BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

CONSIDERATION OF DIVORCE REFORM AND CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

On the orders of the day:

Hon. E. D. Fulton (Kamloops): Mr. Speaker, I notice that the house leader is not present today, so perhaps my question can appropriately be addressed to the right hon. Prime Minister. It has to do with the forecast of legislation dealing with reform of the divorce laws and of the Criminal Code with respect to capital punishment. The question is as follows. In view of the successful and purposeful obscurity in the speech from the throne on this particular point, can the Prime Minister tell us whether these measures will be discussed and decided so far as the government is concerned free of the pressure of the party whip, or whether they are to be regarded as questions involving confidence in the government?

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): It is a matter for consideration, Mr. Speaker, and that consideration, in respect of one of these matters, and perhaps in respect of both, should be reserved until we receive the reports of the parliamentary committees which are dealing with these matters.

Mr. Fulton: On a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker, would the Prime Minister inform the house what parliamentary committee is dealing with the question of capital punishment?

Mr. Pearson: I must have misunderstood my hon. friend. I did not know he had mentioned capital punishment. I was thinking of divorce and the amendment of the Criminal Code, both of which will be before committees very shortly.

So far as capital punishment is concerned, it will be decided by the government how and when to introduce it and, as I have already stated, I think there will be a completely free vote on it in the sense that every hon. member, particularly on this side, will vote according to his conscience, irrespective of the manner in which it is introduced.
