COME-BY-CHANCE, NFLD .- BENEFITS TO PROV-INCE UNDER FEDERAL AGREEMENT TO BUILD WHARF

Mr. Walter C. Carter (St. John's West): My question is directed to the Minister of Public Works. When I directed this question to the Minister of Transport on June 9 he suggested that I direct it to the Minister of Public Works when he was next in the House. My question concerned a statement by an official of the Department of Transport to the effect that the federal government agreement to build a \$16 million wharf to serve the planned refinery at Come-By-Chance, Newfoundland, is contingent on certain additional benefits guaranteeing more revenue for the province of Newfoundland. What are the additional benefits?

Hon. Arthur Laing (Minister of Public Works): Mr. Speaker, the government of Canada had undertaken an offer to build the wharf at Come-By-Chance. It was subject to a clarification in the agreement between the federal government and the province with respect to their ability to repay the investment. The cost of the wharf is recoverable. At the present time there are continuing discussions between officials of the government of Canada, the provincial government and the company with a view to seeing whether we can get this matter straightened out and the work undertaken.

Mr. Carter: Can the minister indicate if the signing of the agreement will be contingent on Newfoundland getting additional benefits other than those already agreed to by the company and the province?

Mr. Laing: What we are interested in, Mr. Speaker, is a financial provision so that the considerable amount of money involved, probably \$16 million, will be returned to the government.
