The Account Book

N the last page of a little; brown, leather-covered account book; filled with prices of eggs, butter, cheese and bread, are written, "All paid in, all paid out." That's the whole story of keeping an expense book there is nothing pleasant in counting up where the pennies go, but it is good business, and since housekeeping is as much of a profession as any other work, you must learn proper values, so you will not tell the butcher, when he says he has no leg of lamb, to send a leg of beef instead!

It is a bad thing to have a running account at the butcher's, the baker's and the candlestick maker's, which John settles every month. Wives should insist on having a certain amount set aside for the household expenditure; what has been enough for one will not keep two; they cannot get along "some

Sometimes it "pays" to go to market; again things may be bought at the door for the same price and the time and expense of the trip will be saved. Now suppose the question of finance has been settled and the house seeper is somewhat experienced in marketing, let her plan, at least the dinners, for a week ahead. These plans may be changed, and probably will be but it is well to have a working basis. If she knows that John has eighty dollars a month and fifteen goes for rent it will be an easy matter to portion out the rest. Now, if all that is spent is noted down for a few months, or years, she can later dispense with the account book, but "where does the noney go?" is a rock on which many a newly launched matrimonial boat has upset, that, with figures in black and white to go by, might have been steered safely into port.

Know how much silver you have and the hall mark on it even the your possessions are small you are not exempt from robbery or well-meaning neighbors who borrow nine forks; and return seven, or from careless laundry men who mix your napkins and send you some one else's, It is a woman's privilege to keep her home in the way that pleases her est, but it is not her privilege to waste anything that rightly belongs to her

family as well as herself. There is a terrifying number of "books of menus," "programs of the week's work," "laundry lists," card indexes of recipes and the like, flooding the market, meant doubtless to help the young housekeeper keep things straight, but all these together will not be so useful as a scrap book, filled with tested recipes approved by her family and suited to her purse. These and a system for accomplishing your work easily will prove the sesame that will open all closed doors.

A writer may plan on paper a dinner of pork, sweet potatoes and apple sauce for you that is all right from a dietetic standpoint and very tempting, but what about that cold mutton in the refrigerator, and the dish of left over rice and the unopened can of tomatoes? LIFE FROM BEHIND Pi Baschien who is devoting much

time to the organization of bank clerks, is out with another essay in "Behind the Wicket," this time nction, "Behind the Wicket," this time a collection of short stories which deal with life in the Canadian banks. In the guise of fiction, the author paints general working conditions among the clerks in a way which is sure to impress all readers that the young man behind the office bars is not so happily situated as he is generally believed to be by persons who hold him in envy. If life is presented with faithfulness in banking institutions the reader if in banking institutions the reader, if ead up in labor problems, cannot but judge that an overhauling of their methods by efficiency experts would result in materially altered conditions of administration. The excessively long hours which clerks are frequently orced to work violates an axiom of modern efficiency experts who produce masses of statistics to prove that the maximum efficiency is obtained from human beings by an eight-hour day. The a serious purpose underlies the book, it makes entertaining reading, and gives vignettes of life in small towns scattered in various parts of the Dominion. One limitation to a full representation of town life is the exacting nature of the bank clerk's duties which often confine his pleasure and activities to behind the wicket, and his view of human nature is taken from the point of the banker.
