FOUR HURT WHEN MOTORS COLLIDE

Thomas Champagne, Chauffeur, Pinned Under Overturned Car—May Die.

RESCUED FROM RAFT

Ten Year Old Boys Floated Mile From Shore at Exhibition.

Thomas Champagne, chauffeur, 340 East Queen street, was seriously injured, and three others less seriously hurt yesterday afternoon when a motor car driven by Champagne, going south on Sherbourne street, collided with another travelling east on Gerrard street. The south-bound car was struck with such force that it was knocked clear across the intersection; it overturned on the east side of Sherbourne street and Champagne was pinned beneath the frame.

John Shafer, 1246 East Gerrard street, the owner of the south-bound car, was thrown from the rear seat to the curbway and badly shaken up. H. R. Mault, 17 Arlington street, driver of the east-bound car, received minor injuries to the head, and Alfred Liacombe, a passenger, also received cuts and bruises by being thrown from the second car.

Every occupant of the two cars required medical attention. Champagne is still in St. Michael's Hospital and is in a critical condition. Mault and Shafer were able to leave that institution last evening. Liacombe was attended at the General Hospital.

Afloat on Raft.
James Sodman and Isaac Lucan, two ten-year-old boys, who live at 30 McCaul street, were taken off a log raft a mile out in the lake off the Exhibition grounds by the life saving crew yesterday afternoon. One of the lookouts at the Exhibition saw the raft bobbing up and down, and when he discerned the two boys on it he sent in the alarm. The boys said another boy had put them on the raft, shoved it away from shore, then had run away and left them.

by the British war department shows that during the landing of British troops in the operations against the Dardanelles, that is, between April 25 and April 30, twenty-six men of the British fleet were killed and fifty-three were wounded.

Australians Rally Well
MELBOURNE, Australia, May 3.—The suspense of the past two days concerning the fighting of the Australian troops on the Gallipoli Peninsula has been somewhat lifted by the publication of the first list of casualties. From the proportion of officers killed and wounded, the losses of the Australians apparently were severe. Although the announcement of the casualties was received without demonstration the feeling here is intense. The minister of defence has issued a statement advising patience.

The news of the fighting in Turkey and the recent parade of troops in Sydney have greatly stimulated recruiting. All previous recruiting records in Sydney have been beaten.

Turkey's Statement
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 2.—Via London, May 3, 3.10 a.m.—The following official communication was issued today:

The left wing of the enemy was several times attacked by us the evening of May 1, from our positions near Gaba Tepeli and driven back in a northerly direction toward Art Burnu.

The enemy yesterday attempted an advance in order to avoid an effective flank fire by our artillery. They were driven back to his old position by our bayonet attack. During this operation we captured two machine guns and all the material and munitions landed by the enemy near Seddul Bahr.

"By reason of our artillery fire the enemy is in an untenable position. The enemy's ships have taken no further action against the straits. An enemy aeroplane flying over the sea near Alexandretta was damaged by our fire and fell into the sea."
