## FINAL PEACE TERMS WILL BE SUBMITTED AT SAME TIME AS TERM FOR ARMISTICE

### ABDICATE OR BE REMOVED SAY SOCIALISTS TO KAISER

**Violent Demonstrations in  
and Panic Flights From  
Lower Rhineland—Finan-  
cial Panic in Berlin.**

London, Oct. 29.—Civilian departures from the lower Rhineland and part of Westphalia, which were begun on a small scale when the first allied bombs hit Cologne, have developed into a panic flight, according to The Hague correspondent of The Daily Mail. All the banks are being stormed by depositors who are withdrawing their savings. In German bank notes of as high a value as are obtainable, the 100 mark note having an appreciable market value over lower currency. But even small notes, of one mark, are being taken eagerly.

Not only are some of the banks at their wits' end for legal currency to pay out deposits, but in places, especially Cologne and Düsseldorf, all except local, and therefore valueless, currency has disappeared as if by magic. Everybody who can possibly afford it, is trying to make his or her way eastward. Scores of houses stand empty.

**Panic in Berlin.**  
Even in Berlin financial panic has seized the people, and the ordinary paper currency of the empire has vanished. The municipality has been compelled to issue emergency currency to the value of about fifty million marks, valid until Feb. 1 next, within the confines of greater Berlin. Tradesmen may refuse to accept this currency, or, at least, decline to change the notes, except when compelled to take them in payment for goods already delivered. The bigger banks have published flaming appeals to "Our Fellow Citizens" not to withdraw deposits and not to hoard currency notes. But the rush on the banks has grown worse than ever.

**Remove the Kaiser.**  
The working population of Cologne, seeing the war factories closed down, big houses evacuated, and east-bound trains crowded with well-to-do fugitives, are demanding immediate peace more insistently than ever. Demonstrations have been held, and a manifesto which has been issued by a section of the Social Democrats declares that if the emperor does not voluntarily abdicate he will be removed. It says: "If the necessity arises and the hour comes, the organized masses of labor, with strong middle class support, will remove every hindrance to peace which does not voluntarily yield to the will of the huge majority of the people."

**SERIOUS RIOTS OCCUR  
IN HUNGARIAN CAPITAL**

London, Oct. 29.—Serious rioting took place at Budapest on Monday evening, according to a Budapest despatch to The Vossische Zeitung of Berlin, which is quoted in a Copenhagen despatch to The Economist. The rioting was caused by a section of the Social Democrats declaring that if the emperor does not voluntarily abdicate he will be removed. It says: "If the necessity arises and the hour comes, the organized masses of labor, with strong middle class support, will remove every hindrance to peace which does not voluntarily yield to the will of the huge majority of the people."

**RHINE VALLEY TOWNS  
BOMBARDED BY BRITISH**

London, Oct. 29.—The British independent air force again has been busily engaged in bombing German positions far behind the battle line and has met with good results, according to the official communication tonight. "On Monday we carried out heavy attacks on the Morhange and Frescati airbases," says the communication. "Monday night we attacked the Badischer soda factory at Mannheim and the railways at Treves and Saarbrücken. The railway junctions of Longvion, Ecouvieux and Thionville also were attacked with excellent results.

"Today the railway junction of Longvion and the airbase at Jametz were attacked."

**DISEASE IN WINNIPEG  
IS BEYOND CONTROL**

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 29.—Local health authorities, as a result of the alarming spread of Spanish influenza since Saturday, admit that the epidemic has got beyond their control. Two hundred and fifty-five new cases, and sixteen deaths were reported today, bringing the total number of cases recorded since the outbreak up to 1462, with fifty deaths.

### To Evacuate Brussels

**Germans Prepare to Leave the City, and Establish Line Between Antwerp and Namur.**

With the British Armies in France and Belgium, Oct. 29.—Between October 10 and 22 various administrative departments were packing up and leaving Brussels for Germany. According to prisoners Brussels is shortly to be evacuated and a line established between Antwerp and Namur.

This was the day on which the Germans were to make their withdrawal from the city, according to statements of prisoners. These prisoners said Ghent would not be defended for more than three or four hours, after which a further withdrawal would be made to the line of Dendre River and Antwerp.

**AMERICAN GUNS CRACK  
ON CONFLANS RAILWAY**

Bombardment With Heavies  
Opens Against German Communications With Metz.

With the American Army North-west of Verdun, Oct. 29.—The American big guns cracked down on the main line of the railroad in the region of Conflans today, and also shelled a large enemy troops concentration in the neighborhood of Mangiennes. The Conflans line is important because it extends from Germany's principal communication line to Metz. The firing in the direction of Conflans continued intermittently throughout the day.

When a troop concentration was reported in the region of Bois de Villers and Mangiennes the guns were turned in that direction, hurling projectiles weighing approximately 1500 pounds each.

At intervals also the big guns inside the American lines shelled the railway around Spincourt and Domary-Baroncourt, both important railroad junctions.

American aviators successfully bombed two points today where German troops were being assembled. In the morning a squadron of bombers, accompanied by protecting machines, dropped projectiles on Montigny. The troops scattered and an ammunition dump was set on fire; the railroad was also damaged.

In the afternoon about fifty bombers attacked Danville, where other troops were concentrating. Observers reported a number of hits. About forty pursuit planes accompanied the bombers and engaged in many combats. Nine German machines were brought down. Three American planes are missing.

**AUSTRIA STILL STRONG;  
ARMY FULL OF FIGHT**

Ally Opposed by Numerically Superior Forces—Peace Attempts on Obsolete Basis.

New York, Oct. 29.—Analysis of the Austrian peace note discloses "a studied attempt, by emphasizing negotiations and 'conference' to force the present situation back to the status of last January, which is now obsolete," declared Dr. Felix Fehrenbach, director of the Italian bureau of public information in this city, tonight.

The recognition of the Jugo-Slavs and the Czech-Slovaks as independent states and co-belligerents with the allies has made impossible any negotiations between this country and Austria on the basis of those sections of President Wilson's terms dealing with the nationalities under the oppressive heel of Austria," he added.

Asserting that Austria's armies today are a strong, well-organized military force with a high morale, he declared that the present Italian drive is not directed against a weakened enemy, "but against a force superior in numbers and capable of hard fighting and bitter resistance."

### NEW FRENCH GAINS WEST OF BANOGNE

Allied Attack Succeeds Upon Front of Over Seven Miles.

**ENEMY IS STUBBORN**

Irresistible Assault Repulses Germans Beyond Recouvrange Road.

Paris, Oct. 29.—In an advance west of Banogne, northeast of Laon, the French today took \$50 prisoners, according to the war office announcement tonight.

The fifth army attacked today on a front of about 7½ miles between St. Quentin-le-Petit and Herpy. The battle is being fought with magnificent spirit on our side, and great stubbornness on the part of the enemy, who has orders to halt us at any price.

"On our left, in spite of an abundance of machine gunners, who tried to check our advance, we succeeded in passing beyond St. Quentin-le-Petit, and carried our line to the neighborhood of Hill 137.

"West of Banogne we also made progress. In the centre our troops have captured the enemy beyond the road of Recouvrange-St. Perveux, over a width of three kilometers.

"To the right we have conquered Hill 156, and advanced more to the east. Prisoners to the number of \$50 have actually been counted."

### MAIN POINTS OF ARMISTICE TERMS ARE AGREED UPON

#### Austria Sends New Note

Asks Wilson's Intervention for Immediate Armistice and Commencement of Peace Negotiations.

Vienna, via Basle, Oct. 29.—Austria-Hungary, thru her new foreign minister, Count Andrássy, has sent a note to Secretary of State Lansing, requesting the secretary's intervention with President Wilson for an immediate armistice on all fronts and for the commencement of peace negotiations.

The note says: "Immediately after having taken direction of the ministry of foreign affairs and after the despatch of the official answer to your note of October 18, 1918, by which you were able to see that we accept all the points and principles laid down by President Wilson in his various declarations and are in complete accord with the efforts of President Wilson to prevent future wars and to create a league of nations, we have taken preparatory measures, in order that Austrians and Hungarians may be able, according to their own desire and without being in any way hindered, to make a decision as to their future organization and to rule it."

"Since the accession to power of Emperor King Charles his immediate purpose has been to bring an end to the war. More than ever this is the desire of the sovereign of all the Austro-Hungarian peoples, who acknowledge that their future destiny can only be accomplished in a peaceful world, by being freed from all disturbances, privations and sorrows of war."

"This is why I address you directly, Mr. Secretary of State, praying that you will have the goodness to intervene with the President of the United States in order that in the interest of humanity, as in the interest of all those who live in Austria-Hungary, an armistice may be concluded on all fronts and for an overtone that immediate negotiations for peace will follow."

The Austro-Hungarian Government has communicated its latest note to the French, British, Japanese and Italian Governments, begging the approval and support of these nations.

**FIVE HUNDRED GUNS  
CAPTURED IN BELGIUM**

Thirty Thousand Prisoners Taken by Allies in Month's Operations in North.

Havre, Oct. 29.—The official communication from Belgian headquarters tonight says:

"The situation is without change. In the period between Oct. 14 and 27 the total number of prisoners captured on this front was 18,232, of whom 231 were officers.

"The Belgian army captured 7382 of the Second British Army 5584, and the French army 5577. Between Sept. 28 and Oct. 14, 12,000 prisoners were taken. Thus in one month the total number of prisoners reached more than 30,000. Materials of all kinds were also captured, but have not yet been inventoried.

"Between October 14 and 27, 509 cannons were captured and 12,000 machine guns."

**EXTREME MEASURES  
DETERMINED BY KAISER**

Paris, Oct. 29.—Extremely important decisions were taken at the meeting of the crown council held under the presidency of Emperor William at Berlin on Saturday, says a despatch from Zurich to Le Journal.

The greatest agitation prevails in the reichstag, where groups of deputies, the message adds, are sitting continuously.

Considerable nervousness, it is said, prevails in German military circles as a result of the decisions reached at the crown council. The German Government, it is declared, is determined to resort to extreme measures.

### BRITISH ADVANCE; AUSTRIANS WEAKEN

Monticorno River is Crossed and Several Hundred Prisoners Taken.

London, Oct. 29.—The resistance of the Austrians against the British in the Italian theatre appears to be weakening, according to an official communication issued tonight. The British tenth army continues its advance east of the Piave River. The text of the communication follows:

"The advance of our tenth army continues, according to plan. The enemy resistance appears to be weakening considerably. Early in the morning the enemy was holding the line on the River Monticorno with a number of machine guns. British cavalry and infantry forced a passage of this river northeast of Vazzola, making prisoners of several hundred of the enemy. The Forte-Buffole Aerodrome is reported to be in flames.

"The British raided enemy trenches opposite Asiago, but found them unoccupied.

"The Italian armies operating north from the Montello are making good progress."

**GERMANS START STORY  
OF THREAT OF UPRISING**

Washington, Oct. 29.—The German military party is putting out a story that a Bolshevik uprising is threatened in Germany, according to reports reaching the state department today from Switzerland. The evident intent of the reports, it is believed here, is to persuade the allies not to make too drastic terms with Germany in the peace settlements.
