HAMILTON HAPPENINGS SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING TO HEAR RAILWAY BOARD

By Special Request, But on Mayor's Casting Vote—Board of Health Increases.

Hamilton, Jan. 28.—(Special.)—The council had a long session this evening. Thru Mayor Stewart, the Ontario railway and municipal board, which has been dealing with the city's complaints against the Hamilton Street Railway Company, asked that a special meeting of the city council be held next Wednesday, when the board would address the meeting. The board appears to be anxious to fix up a compromise. Some of the aldermen took the ground that since the city had tried in vain to get an agreement that would bind the company it was useless to hear the board, and they introduced a resolution asking the board to give its judgment in the case. On the casting vote of the mayor, it was agreed to give the board a hearing. Albert Pain and William Kavanagh were reappointed to the parks board, only the four labor aldermen voting against them. The firemen's increase was laid over until the next meeting, but the salaries bylaw, which said no increases could be considered until April, was amended so that they may be dealt with in February. A bylaw aimed at the amalgamated tuck and screw companies, to prevent them from locating their factory in the rear of the hospital grounds was left in the committee of the whole, the members of the company declaring that if the bylaw was carried they would move their factory away from Hamilton. They pledged themselves not to proceed with the work of erecting buildings or take any action until they had a conference with the hospital governors and a committee of the council. On Tuesday Ald. Farrar and Peabody found fault because a couple of deputations had gone on jaunts without the authority of the council.

The minority stockholders of the H. G. & B. stirred up a little excitement at the annual meeting to-day. They discovered that the directors had issued \$200,000 stock, so as to have a sufficient voting power to go on with the extension to St. Catharines and the Niagara frontier. The minority party claimed that it was illegal. The financial statement showed that the company's earnings last year amounted to \$24,000, and that no dividend was declared this year. The directors said they saw no reason why there should not be a dividend at the end of the present session. The following directors were re-elected: J. W. Gibson, W. C. Hawkins, J. Rutherford, John Dickinson, J. W. Nesbitt, K.C.; John G. Gaud and J. R. Moodie. The board of health held its inaugural meeting this afternoon, when Frank Quinn was reappointed chairman. This evening the board passed the estimates for 1907. They provide for the expenditure of \$18,000. All the officials in the employ of the board are recommended for salary increases. Dr. Roberts is down for an increase of \$200, making his salary \$1200; the inspectors are each down for \$100, the assessors from \$5.50 per day to \$6 for two men and a team; the clerk in the medical health office, from \$5 a week to \$30 per month; the man who rubs the oil at the crematory, \$125 more per year. Stewart & Wilton were appointed sanitarians for the winter. The hospital, and committees were chosen to secure a site and to proceed with the arrangements. A resolution that the effluent from the Westwark sewage effluent works be turned into the coal oil inlet was adopted, and will be forwarded to the city council. It is thought that the chemicals in the effluent might purify the inlet waters.

REMEDY FOR RAILWAYS IS PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

Young Liberals Say So in Discussing the Beach Entrance—Bourassa Censured.

A meeting of the Young Liberals of Toronto in the Labor Temple last evening to discuss the "railway question as it affects Toronto," came to the conclusion that public ownership of the railroads is the only remedy which goes deep enough to remove the cause of complaint. F. S. Mearns presided over the meeting.

H. Dickinson opened the discussion by saying that if a man commits murder he gets punished, but that a great corporation can run its Jugernaut lines into a thickly populated city knowing that it will level crossings with a fearful death roll and go unpunished. Na, it could obtain a license permitting it to force its plans on the city. He thought the system of free passes to government officials subverted them from their duties in this matter, but that the same system was an iniquity. Citizens should have a right to walk on the level of their streets, and hit any city over 100,000 inhabitants the lines should go underground.

Elgin Scholt said the fact that three lines were seeking admittance was evidence that the time was ripe for something to be done. As a lawyer he had been told to believe that "wherever there is an injury there is a remedy." If existing laws did not protect our rights, we must seek further statutory protection. He thought the Don Valley was the natural entrance to the city.

A. Ross, a "young Liberal" of advanced years, defended the G. T. R. from many of the statements in regard to the railway. He pointed out that the stock of the railway was not a financial disaster, but a financial triumph. He said that the railway was a financial triumph, and that the question was more a financial than an engineering one.

Mr. Briggs said the public must not construe the meeting as an attack upon the Liberal government at Ottawa. The rest of the country was waiting for what Toronto was opposing. Toronto was the biggest distributing center in the world, and in the face of the engineering triumphs in the Rockies it was foolish to talk of insurmountable difficulties around Scarborough.

After the reading of minutes, Mr. Dickinson proceeded to blacken Henri Bourassa's eye with the following resolution: That this meeting of the Young Liberal Club of Toronto expresses regret at the attitude of one Bourassa, now endeavoring to cause a discussion in the ranks of the Liberal party in our sister Province of Quebec, and while not wishing to hamper any member's speech, we, the undersigned, respectfully suggest that he fight out his grievances in the party caucus rather than on the hustings in the face of the enemy.
