KILLING OF ED. WANDLE MALICIOUS, SAYS JURY

Verdict Against Negro John Boyd
for York Street Murder—
Police Commended.

That Edward F. Wandle came to his death on June 11, 1907, in City of Toronto, from the effects of a wound inflicted by a revolver in the hands of John Boyd. And that the said John Boyd on above date did feloniously, wilfully and with malice aforethought, kill and murder the said Edward Wandle against the peace of our lord the king, his crown and dignity.

This jury would recommend that Constables McCrae and Turner be commended for their alertness in securing the prisoner.

The above verdict was returned by the jury at Coroner Graham's inquest last night.

The star witness was Olive Boocay, a waitress in the victim's restaurant. Her evidence strongly condemned the prisoner.

She stated that Boyd called at the restaurant at 11 o'clock and asked if his wife was in. Wandle, who was sitting behind the counter, replied that she was not. Boyd then asked Wandle if he might go to the kitchen and see for himself. Wandle refused, and at the same time requested Boyd to go out. Boyd explained that he did not want to take the woman away, but wanted to give her a message. Wandle again ordered Boyd from the place, in fact, two or three times, but Boyd just stood there. Wandle shut his fist and rushed from behind the counter. Boyd said "You hit me I will put this place on the bum."

Got Loaded Case.

Wandle went back after a few minutes (loaded) which was kept behind the counter. He rushed at Boyd and the latter said to him, "Come out and fight like a man."

Wandle replied, "I don't have to fight you dirty dog." Boyd opened the door and peeked in when Wandle made a blow at him with the cane from his position behind the counter. Twice Wandle attempted to hit him and after words, Wandle rushed to the door and his Boyd with the cane. Boyd stood there and then rushed away.

Witness stated that the last words Wandle said to her was, "I am going upstairs. Olive, mind the shop." Shortly afterwards she heard distinct shots that seemed to come from the hallway. A minute or two afterwards she heard a couple more shots. Then Boyd came downstairs.

Witness admitted that she took possession of the cane and gave it to George Fletcher, a friend of Boyd's. She was told it would be wanted in court. She was sure that Wandle had nothing in his hand when he went upstairs, nor was he excited.

Witness testified that there was enmity between the prisoner and Wandle; the latter had told her that he did not want Boyd around the place because of the trouble he was causing with the theft of a bicycle from 40 Rope-avenue.

Hamilton Happenings

**ACCUSED AT SESSIONS
ARE ALL ACQUITTED**

Judge Snyder's Caustic Remark to
Jurors—Board of Health Will
Postpone Action.

HAMILTON, June 13.—(Special).—In the sessions of the peace to-day, John Brady, accused of an unnatural offence, was found not guilty. Judge Snyder told the jurors that he hoped they could reconcile their verdict with their conscience. William Smith, accused of the charge of using a "digger," Joseph Fisher, a fellow employee who testified against him, was an unwilling witness, and the judge threatened to send him to jail. Louis Tackman and Meyer Cohen, who furnished the bail for Henry Tush, had to forfeit the money because Tush did not turn up.

The case of Austin Carty, suing the Hamilton Painless Dental Parlor, because they caused him pain by leaving a piece of an extracted tooth in his gums, was not finished. On Sunday, true bills were brought in by the grand jury against Maggie Sullivan and Nellie McDonald, Toronto, accused of stealing clothing from their brother-in-law.

The board of health this evening decided to postpone action on the application of the hospital governors for permission to establish a hospital for advanced cases of consumption on the City Hospital grounds until the next meeting. R. B. Hill was given fifteen days in which to abate an alleged nuisance.

The Wentworth Historical Society asked the parks board this evening to fix up the library at Princess Louise, and the grandmothers' room in Dundurn Park in their original style. A sub-committee will consider. The board said that it had no jurisdiction over the historical society. No action was taken with reference to Crawford, who has the refreshment privileges in Dundurn Park, until the charge against him, of selling ice cream on Sunday, is settled Monday in police court. The city solicitor was instructed to draw up a by-law, regulating the speed at which autos cars may run thru Dundurn Park and also the hours.

The board of education this evening passed the salary schedule for the year 1907-1908, with the following additions: Miss Craft, collegiate institute teacher, from \$800 to \$900; Miss Taylor, from \$550 to \$600; E. Fuller, caretaker King Edward School, from \$525 to \$550, and A. Bowman, Hess-street, from \$600 to \$625.

Thomson Hill, who was granted leave of absence to visit the old world until Sept. 1, Charles Smith was granted leave of absence until Oct. 1. No commendation that Miss McPherson be appointed supervisor of domestic science, at a salary of \$800 a year, was received by the board. Mr. Smith would stand by his charge, that religious and political pull was exerted in the board.

The mountain drain trouble has broken out in a new spot, and now the city is threatened with damage to the farms that surround the property the drain runs, a distance of some five miles. The first suit will be commenced to-morrow. W. A. H. Duff has received instructions from Adam Inch to sue the city for \$1500 damages for injury that is alleged was done by the city's employees in throwing earth from the ditch, proceeding that was forced upon the city by the Barton Township council, which insisted that the grade of the ditch should be improved. Every farmer along the line considers that he has a claim against the city similar to the one made by Mr. Inch.

William Felker, a Tapleton farmer, who was awaiting trial on the charge of assaulting his wife, was found dead this morning at his home, as the result of a dose of carbolic acid. He waited all day in court yesterday for his case to be called, and went home in the evening, and after staying until 9 o'clock with his father, went to bed and drank the acid. His wife's heartbroken, as she is satisfied that his mind has been unbalanced for some time. The deceased was a neighbor of Philander Burdick's, who murdered his wife and child and committed suicide last fall.

H. A. Sager, the retiring assistant postmaster, was presented with a travelling bag for his wife by the employees of the postoffice. The postmaster, J. H. Brown, made the presentation. John S. Matthews will succeed Mr. Sager.

The beach commissioners have passed a by-law prohibiting the removal of sand or gravel from the beach.

SIX HUNDRED MAY QUIT EMPLOYMENT MONDAY

Shipbuilders and Boiler Makers
Unable to Agree With
Employers.

Indications point to a strike of the boilermakers and shipbuilders. Both unions have failed to reach a settlement with their employers, and unless the situation changes before Monday next the men will all go out. If these unions decide to strike it will mean that at least 600 men will be added to those who are already out. The men are of the opinion, however, that the bosses will not permit things to go so far, they have received no proposal for a settlement from the employers.

An organization of this kind, the Employers' Association yesterday morning issued a statement declaring that it had been called a strike, but was strictly a defence organization. It did not care whether there were unions or not, and had no intention of "getting after those bodies."

The organization of this kind, the statement declared, was a necessity in Toronto. With 2000 men in the city on strike, and talk of more going out, it was time that somebody endeavored to promote industrial peace.

Employers, the report continued, should get together and insist on their rights or equal opportunity and the protection of unorganized labor.
