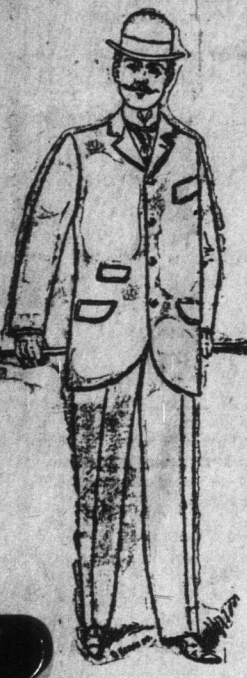

The Toronto members ought to lose no time in presenting the claims of this city for assistance from the Government towards the Dominion Exhibition, which it is proposed to hold here in 1897. Montreal will likely steal a march on us unless our aldermen and representatives at Ottawa get a move on. Our rival in the exhibition business for next year has been successful in inducing the Premier to appoint a commission of four Ministers, himself included, to co-operate with leading Montreal representatives in furthering the interests of the proposed International Exhibition.

Before going any further, this Government Commission ought to decide whether it is not better policy to help the Toronto rather than the Montreal project. Many substantial reasons can be presented why the Government should favor a Dominion Exhibition in Toronto rather than an International Exhibition in the sister city. We take it the Government will not assist both, because the two exhibitions could not be carried on successfully during the same year. We say that Toronto can undoubtedly make out the better case. Next year is to be an unusually important and interesting one for this city. The British Science Association is to meet in Toronto. The meeting will bring distinguished men here from all over the United States and Canada, as well as from Great Britain. The event will be one of more than continental importance. Toronto is, next year, to be the scene of an historical celebration in connection with the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of Canada by Cabot. Our City Hall and Court House, the greatest building of the kind in Canada, is to be formally opened next year, with appropriate ceremonies. If the Prince of Wales cannot be induced to attend the ceremony, it is not improbable that the Duke of York will visit Toronto for that purpose. The holding of a Dominion Exhibition in Toronto next year would be a fitting climax to all these other attractions.

Montreal, of course, is entitled to seek Government assistance or an International Exhibition, but it is unfortunate that she should select the very year that Toronto has chosen for her big blow-out. Toronto was first in the field for a great celebration in 1897. This point should have no little weight with the Government, when it comes to consider the claims of the two cities. In addition to this, fifty thousand dollars devoted to the holding of an exhibition here will go as far as two or three times that amount expended in Montreal. We already have the grounds and the bigger part of the necessary buildings. If Montreal should go on with her exhibition, almost an entire new outfit of buildings would be necessary. Besides, the business men of that city appear to be undecided whether to go on with the show, or not. It appears to us that the interval between now and next summer is far too short to make the necessary preparations for an International Exhibition that will do credit to Canada. The people of Montreal do not appear to be enthusiastic over the proposal. We quote from an editorial in The Montreal Star of Wednesday:

It is now for the people of Montreal to decide whether they will declare in no uncertain way whether or not they wish to entertain a general exhibition of the kind which the Government has shown where it stands and it is the turn of Montreal to "speak now."

We would not urge the Federal Ministry to give one cent toward the cost of such an exhibition, but we would urge the people of Montreal and those who expect to make a profit out of the exhibition to contribute with generous generosity to the enterprise. In any case, Mr. Laurier has earned Montreal's thanks for his prompt and effective interest in the affair.

This quotation would indicate that the city of Montreal is not yet prepared to undertake what may turn out to be a white elephant. Toronto, on the other hand, is committed to a bigger display than usual in 1897. We are ready and anxious to go ahead, and the Government has decided to adopt the Toronto proposal, the exhibition may rest assured that the exhibition will be arranged here that will be thoroughly representative of the whole Dominion, and that will be to a large extent representative of its character, because we will have with us visitors from all over America and from Europe.
