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## MR. CLARKE WALLACE RETURNS

Feels of the Need for Orangemen in the Old Land as Well as in the New

Hon. N. Clarke Wallace yesterday returned from the Old Country, where he had been as a delegate to the Triennial Council of the Grand Orange Lodge, which held its meetings in Glasgow.

One of the features of the meeting, Mr. Wallace said, was the increased desire by the delegates for Imperial Federation. The conference was one of the most enthusiastic ever held, and the result will be to bring about a closer union among Orangemen all over the world.

The Orangemen in the Old Land are on the eve of being engaged in a problem similar to the Manitoba school question. Hon. Mr. Wallace proposed to establish a Catholic University in Ireland, notwithstanding the fact that Trinity College, Dublin, is open to students of all denominations. This is creating considerable excitement, and resolutions have been passed in many lodges in opposition to the scheme, threatening the Government that if they persevere in the attempt the whole Orange body will oppose them.

Mr. Wallace says the order is very strong in the North of Ireland, and is growing in the South. In Scotland there are 500 lodges. The lodges in London, Liverpool, Lancashire and the West Riding of Yorkshire are numerous and in a very healthy state.

Left a Quarter of a Million.

Will of the Late James Neilson of Scarborough Township Entered for Probate Yesterday.

The will of Mr. James Neilson, late of Scarborough, and formerly of the firm of A. V. Delaporte & Co., grain and produce, was yesterday entered for probate.

The estate consists of \$3844 book debts and promissory notes, \$10,167 in mortgages, \$24,542 in bank stock and shares, and \$221,311 cash in bank.

The executor, Robert Kilgus, and Alex. Neilson, a brother, are requested to provide for Helen Neilson, sister of the deceased, as long as she lives. Two nieces, Agnes Neilson Kennedy and Jane Neilson Jackson, receive \$10,000 each, and the remainder of the estate is divided equally among three nephews, Alexander, John and James Neilson.
