

Gamey's Spirited in the Box Flashes of Keen Satire from Counsel and Witness All Day Add Zest to Story of Political Venality

None of the Striking Features of the Formal Charge of Boule Work Shaken Thru the Arduous Day's Cross-Examination of the Member for Mantoulin.

"I am tired," said R. R. Gamey. "And I am tired," returned E. F. B. Johnston. "You have my sympathy," remarked Mr. Gamey. S. H. Blake put in a less gentle observation. "I should much rather have my learned friend's satire than your sympathy," declared Mr. Johnston, with a touch of scorn.

Sir John Boyd had made a kindly enquiry to speak long of the foregoing dialogue. It is a fair indication of the bitterness and innuendo that the chief counsel for the defence injected into the cross-examination of R. R. Gamey.

Mr. Johnston did not lose a single opportunity to blacken, directly or indirectly, the character of the member for Mantoulin, and to stigmatize his motives. His attack yesterday, as the day before, was directed upon Gamey, rather than upon Gamey's charges, tho, in the concluding hour of the cross-examination, a strong effort was made to shake some of the most important statements included in the indictment.

No Quarter Asked, None Given. In the merciless cross-examination, no quarter was asked, and none was given. Throughout the ordeal, E. F. B. Johnston was aggressive, at times it appeared, wantonly aggressive. When, for instance, Mr. Johnston was equipping in the methods employed by Sir John Johnston to get the witness, as he described the witness as a detective, a spy and an informer.

RELIC OF GROSSER CRIME

Frightfully Mutilated Body of a Man Found by New York Police in Barrel.

Eighteen Stab Wounds in Neck and other Places on Corpse.

New York, April 14.—Another horrible murder mystery is engaging the attention of the police. Early this morning a scrubman noticed a barrel on the sidewalk on East 11th-street, near the docks, from which was hanging a man's coat soaked with blood. In the barrel was found the body of an Italian, still warm, with a throat cut. It is supposed the murderer had the body in a wagon and intended to throw it into the river, but found the place closed. In the clothes was found a note, which it is supposed the murderer wrote. It is supposed the murderer was a woman's servant named Barker. The man is supposed to have been in good circumstances.

BUT NOT THROWN.

The last excuse of Crown attorneys for not closing all gambling joints in York County has been defeated by the Court of Appeal. The following decision was rendered at Osgoode Hall yesterday, and whole-sale prosecutions will follow.

A gambling case was appealed from the County Court of York. One James, of Toronto, was discharged on a charge of keeping a gambling house, on the ground that the racket which it was proved he kept was not shown to have been more than sufficient to pay for the refreshments and cigars supplied to the members. Their Lordships held that it was not necessary to show that the accused made a profit, but that it was sufficient that he kept a house where gambling was carried on.

SENTIMENT BLINDS LEADER TO PARTY DUTY IN ONTARIO

Ottawa, April 14.—(World Staff Correspondence).—The health of Sir Oliver Mowat was again brought up in the House this afternoon. Before the orders of the day were called, Mr. Maclean (East York) brought the matter to the attention of the Prime Minister. He began by stating that his motives had been impugned by hon. gentlemen, who again impugned them by their jeers, but he felt he was doing his duty to the people of Ontario in making known the serious condition of the Lieutenant-Governor. He repudiated any suggestion that he desired to reflect on the venerable old man, whom "everybody is so fond of," and he stated that he had given notice of his intention to bring this matter forward in the House at an early date.

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Canada's Political Horoscope For a Year's Aspect of Government's Desire to Rush Redistribution Bill General Election for Country This Fall

Conflict of Party Leaders Waged Warmly Over Terms of Bill in Commons—Suggestion That Privy Council Should Review Case—Points Against Attitude of Liberals.

Ottawa, Ont., April 14.—(World Staff Correspondence).—After an all-day debate the redistribution bill was given a second reading and referred to a select committee of the House. The debate developed the fact that the government is anxious to get into a position where it may go to the country in a moment's notice. This may be due to the traditional desire of the government to be ever ready for an emergency or it may have a deeper significance and refer to the precarious state of Sir Wilfrid's health.

That a general election is in the air is evident to those who are accustomed to size up the situation. The party must go to the country with the popular Premier. How long it can put off the fatal day is a question that is causing much anxiety. Ministers are not in robust health may not strike one who sees him every day, but the World correspondent is in a position to say that his intimate friends are not reassured by the way he has chirked up during the session.

Ontario Ministers Indifferent. Another fact was developed. The Ontario Ministers and the Ontario supporters of the government have done nothing to retain the present representation of the province, or increase the representation of cities in Ontario. A voice from the Liberal side has been heard along these lines. Nor has the Ontario government done anything to see that the dispersed sections of the British North America Act have been properly interpreted.
