Montreal, Que., July 5.—(Special).—The Sunday Sun publishes to-day a sensational story, declaring that Edward Farrer has been employed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to stir up the Roman Catholics of Manitoba so as to embarrass the Roblin government.

"Sir Wilfrid," the Sun says, "has a confidential agent upon whom he relies to carry out missions that most Canadians would balk at. This man has a record. He was denounced as a traitor to Canada and the empire by Sir Charles Tupper at Windsor, Ont., in the campaign of 1891. The proof was a document traced to his author. Waterspout Strikes Park Loss of Life May Be Great

Pleasure Seekers Carried Down Ravine and Twenty Are Known to Be Dead

Greenburg, Pa., July 5.—A waterspout of immense proportions struck in the vicinity of Oakford Park, at 4 o'clock this afternoon, and created a flood that caused great loss of life and property. It is known that at least twenty persons lost their lives, and rumors place the number of dead at more than 100, but up to a late hour to-night only three or four bodies have been recovered, having been washed to the banks of the little creek that runs parallel with the park. The names of those known and believed to have been drowned are:

Warned Crowd to Flee.
At 5 o'clock rain began to fall in torrents in the vicinity of the park, and spread over a territory covering probably ten miles. Half an hour later the rain fell in a deluge, and the waterspout broke in the great walls of the dam, hurled among the crowds of pleasure seekers who had gathered under the roofs of the eating stands, the dancing pavilion and other buildings, warned the crowd to flee. The waterspout was the two unknown women brought to the park being located in a ravine, about a quarter of a mile wide and a mile long. The people were loath to leave their protection, and not until 7:30 p.m. did they begin to scatter.

CEAR TO GLORIFY ST. SERAPHIM.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The czar is going to the Desert of Sarov to attend the glorification of St. Seraphim, the founder of the Diveyevo monastery, which has become a place of pilgrimage. The priests in the desert reported a few months ago that the body of the saint, who died a hundred years ago, was in exactly the same state when it had been put into the coffin. The glorification will begin July 30 and last four days. The czar means to arrive at Sarov Desert on the 25th, so as to precede himself for the occasion by prayer and fasting. He will be accompanied by the high court functionaries. The czar will be attended by the ladies of her court. The czar will wear imperial robes during the ceremony.

PACKING PLANT BURNED.

Saint Joseph, Missouri, July 5.—Fire originated in the casing department of the Hammond packing plant this afternoon and spread rapidly through the main building.
