MONOPOLY IN AIRSHIPS

All Private Ownership.

Berlin, July 31. - The great interest displayed in the recent development of aerial navigation, especially with French military airships, is mixed with some anxiety. New problems are to be solved and there is a lively discussion on the subject in military and political circles and in the newspapers, the keynote of which is the grave danger of foreign dirigible balloons examining German fortifications. It is asked what is there to prevent French airships, for instance, from hovering over strategic points in Germany with telescopic cameras, and it ner, to meet the danger by creating a state monopoly in airships.

Col. Wagner would have a law bidding anybody except the Government to build, possess or use such vessels without a special license, and empowering the Government to expropriate all private airships and to banish all foreign ones. Anyone attempting to evade the law would be fired upon if necessary, and the occupants of the airship would be tried as spies if the circumstances were suspicious. The legislation must extend from the frontiers to the sky, thereby partitioning the atmosphere so that-the air above every country will belong to it as

much as the land itself. The discussion covers a wide range including all points raised from the time the first dirigible airship opened new possibilities. The Deutsche Tageszeitung editorially demands the speedy building of a fleet of aerial warships, which, it says, will be specially valuable in a war with Great Britain, balancing Germany's naval

A new application of the motor cycle to military service has been invented in Austria. It concerns the quick laying of telephone and telegraph wiren. In front of the cycle is installed a cylindrical roll or reel upon which the wire is wound, and a man sitting in the moving car lays the wire, by manns of a long pole, either in the tors of the trees, or, if there is none, in the ditches or gutters. With the new apparatus these wires of wires may be hidden 12 minutes.

When the hair has turned entirely gray or the scalp is entirely bald, othing can be done. During the irradiation the greatest care is taken to protect that part of the hair not being treated. The head is covered with a cap of tinfoll through which a hole is cut one and a half inches in diameter, and on this the rays are concentrated. The same spot is not irradiated oftener than once in six days. When the two general irradiations have been given, the whole of the hair is exposed to the Xray. The hair upon the front of the head, which always changes first, gets more treatments than at the back. The effect becomes noticeable after the sixth or seventh treatment, but in cases where the hair has lately turned gray or even in particular spots. a single treatment often restores com-

The effect of the treatments the patient's physical condition is carefully noted, and if any sign of fatigue or lassitude is shown the treatment is stopped for a day or two until the patient is again vigorous. It should not, however, be understood that in the hands of a competent person there is danger. There is nothing in the least
