B. N. A. BANK PROSPERS

The Half-Yearly Report Issued Shows
Substantial Progress.

The half yearly report of the Bank
of British North America, as shown
by a statement issued by the directors,
shows the bank to be making solid and
substantial progress.

The profits of the half year are
shown to be close onto 70,000, out of
which the directors report an interim
dividend of 30 shillings per share, which
is at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.
A balance of nearly £38,000 is left to be
carried forward.

With its usual foresight, the bank
lays aside this immense sum to pro-
vide for possible losses in connection
with the San Francisco disaster. Of
course, the losses cannot be very great
there, as the bank lost nothing through
the destruction of the premises, which
were leasehold. It is also stated that
all the money and securities in the
bank at the time of the disaster were
saved through the faithfulness of the
staff. But the personal effects of the
latter were destroyed, and the bank
has set aside for some time to be
ready for the prompt settlement of any
of these personal losses, should occa-
sion demand it.
