When General Sir Arthur Currie stepped out from the portals of the Masonic Hall yesterday afternoon following the Canadlan Club luncheon held in his honor he was greeted with tremendous cheering on the part of hundreds of spectators and several score great war veterans drawn up on parade on Queen's avenue. This road from Wellington street to Park avenue had been closed temporarily to vehicular traffic OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Strong Opposi-tion criticism of the league of nations was voiced in the House of Commons was voiced in the House of Commons today. Generally, as was expected, the criticism centered around the tenth article and the obligations thereunder placed on members of the league to preserve against external aggression the territorial integrity of all members of the league.

"Are we bound henceforth to take irt in outside affairs?" queried the ting leader of the Opposition.

Canada, Dr. Beland feared, was assuming more international obligations without increasing her international states. "Under this convention," Dr. Beland declared, "the council of the league of nations is given the right to dispose of Canadian troops for the quelling of disorders in any of the five continents."

Mr. McKenzie took the view, too, that Canada has not yet reached the full status of nationality. "We are not," he argued, "able to declare war and peace." If Canada, as a separate nation, bound herself to observe the league covenant, she might have to fight even the mother country. Nor would Canada's action on the treaty alter it in the slightest degree. Submitting it to the Dominion parliament merely "tickled the fancy" of some members and made them feel more important.

Replying for the Government Mr. Sifton, minister of public works, took the view that Canada was fully entitled to sit in the peace councils. He described Mr. McKenzie's arguments as agreeing absolutely "with the most
