STRATFORD, March 18.—Stratford Midgets are champions of the Junior Northern League for the fourth successive year. The contest was fairly active, but the reaction of the Midgets' defeat in the O. H. A. had the effect of dampening the enthusiasm for the N. H. L. The cup was to have been formally presented, but the players got off the ice too quickly. The Midgets own the old N. H. L. cup, and tonight got a foothold on the new one.
