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MILAN WORKMEN SEIZE TWO HUNDRED CHEMICAL PLANTS

SOCIALIST UPRISING IN TRIESTE IS PUT DOWN AFTER CASUALTIES ARE INFLICTED BY GOVT. TROOPS

Fighting in Streets of City Was Furious While It Lasted—Socialists Dug Trenches in the Streets—Government Artillery Placed for Concerted Attack When Revolting Forces Decide to Withdraw.

Trieste, Sept. 11.—A Socialist revolt in which barricades were erected in the streets, and artillery, rifles, machine guns and bombs were freely employed in a struggle between the rioters and the military, broke out here yesterday afternoon. Italian troops and naval forces, however, succeeded in completely restoring order last night. The fighting was sharp while it lasted. The Socialists, who were well armed and amply supplied with ammunition, challenged the troops to advance upon their barricades. Both sides then opened fire and sharp volleys were exchanged. Several of the soldiers were wounded by bullets from the rifles of the entrenched Socialists, while numerous casualties occurred in the Socialist ranks.

Artillery Makes Ready.
As evening drew near the military drew up in position and prepared for a concerted attack. Before this was delivered, however, Civil Governor Mosconi sent an ultimatum to the Socialist leaders ordering them to withdraw from the streets. The leaders of the revolt ultimately decided to bow before the governor's threat of more drastic measures, and the rioting lay down. The Socialists had held, thereupon were withdrawn from their barracks through the streets, the men shouting cries of "Victory!" from their cannons.

Destroyers Take Part.
The destroyer, which played a part in the action to put down the revolt, arrived in the harbor during the afternoon and anchored immediately facing the public square. Civil Governor Mosconi issued an order for the destroyer to open fire on the streets at 10 p.m., and also forbidding anyone looking out of windows or balconies in the district, where sniping has been frequent. LABOR CONGRESS WOULD PREFER MEIGHEN TO REMAIN AWAY
Difference of Opinion About Canadian Premier at the Windsor Meeting.

ATTENDANCE MAY DROP

Split Among Organizations Seems To Be Emphasized by Some Straight Talk

RED FLAGS OF BOLSHEVISM ARE HOISTED ABOVE ITALIAN CHEMICAL PLANTS IN MILAN
More Than 200 Factories Are Occupied by Workmen at a Given Signal—Order Came From the Chamber of Labor—Seizure Was Made to Assure Metal Workers of Materials to Carry on Industry.

Milan, Sept. 11.—More than 200 chemical works here were occupied by workmen at a given signal late yesterday, and red flags were hoisted above them on orders issued by the chamber of labor.

The chemical plants were occupied simultaneously, the movement being carried out following a signal of three blasts on a large siren. Immediately afterward, red flags and banners bearing the Bolshevik emblems of the hammer and scythe were hoisted. The workers obeyed the order received from the chamber of labor in spite of the fact that they were recently granted wage increases of from 60 to 70 cents per day.

The chamber of labor, in explaining the seizure of the chemical works, declared that the move was not in the nature of a real occupation of the plants, but was simply a measure which was necessary to guarantee metal workers the materials they need to carry on their industry.

ITALIAN TROOPS SEIZE BOMBS IN LUCCA FACTORY
Paris, Sept. 11.—Three companies of Italian infantry have seized a factory at Lucca, which had been occupied by workmen, and have forced the men in the plant to surrender 60,000 bombs, according to dispatches received here. Another report states that workers, using armored trucks, invaded a French-owned factory at Turin. They are said to have distributed arms to workers there, and to have searched all the employees not joining in the movement.

POLICE SHOOT UP TOWN AND FIRE BUILDINGS
London Hears of Terrifying Scenes During Reprisal by Constables.

London, Sept. 10.—King Victor Emmanuel of Italy may be asked to abdicate to avert bloodshed in the industrial revolution of Italian workmen and communists, according to a dispatch from Milan, where the general confederation of labor convened today. Deputies are taking part in the great labor conference at Milan, which is to consider the policy of all organized labor in Italy toward the Soviet republics of the iron and steel workers.

Think "Communism Workable."
Aristocrat delegates to the third international at Moscow were quoted as saying that they believed "communism is working the best." The Italian situation is expected when the troops try to retake the factories that have been seized by the workers.

The Italian newspaper Avanti prints a cartoon of a soldier and a working man shaking hands, as indicative of its opinion as to what would happen if troops were sent against the workmen.

SECRETARY HUNT PREDICTS RECORD ATTENDANCE AT FAIR
Fifty-Third Annual Exhibition Promises To Be Best in History—Rush for Space Unprecedented—Entries Smash All Former Records.

The formal commencement of London's fifty-third annual exhibition was marked this morning by the manning of gates at the exhibition grounds, and while the attendance on preparation day is not great, the official prediction is that the process of record-smashing will be undertaken on Monday.

All exhibitors are hard at work today, for they are under obligation to have everything in readiness for Monday. Then the first grandstand performance is to be given, and the school children of the city are to enjoy the benefit of reduced rates and an augmented program.

Before 10 o'clock this morning, all of the cattle exhibits were in their barns, and sheep were coming in at a rate that astonished officials. Practically all out-of-town exhibits have been set up, and only local displays remain unfinished.

Rush For Space.
During the past twenty-four hours two or three exhibitors have rearranged their displays and requisitioned smaller portions of the space they had previously reserved. A scramble for the ground followed and scores of exhibitors are expected to arrive today. Tractors and other farm equipment are receiving unusual attention. Several man-

Australian Audience Breaks Up Concert When "God Save the King" Is Left Off Program
Adelaide, South Australia, Sept. 11.—The concert given here Thursday evening by John McCormack, the noted tenor, was broken up by a demonstration, part of the audience rising and singing the British National Anthem, and some shouting that McCormack was a Sinn Féiner. Mr. McCormack has cancelled the other concerts he was to have given in Adelaide.

The audience, it appeared, resented the omission of the National Anthem from the program. In explanation, the tenor, who is in Australia on a tour of the world, which he started from the United States last May, says he had understood the anthem was usually sung only when the governor was present.

REACTOR GROUP
Hebert Lewis, business agent of the Machinists' Union, said that the progressive wing of the trades union movement took the congress seriously no longer, and that the invitation to the premier to attend was not a serious one. He said that the invitation was made among trades unionists was endeavoring to control the movement for their purposes.

"We know what the premier will say. It will be like his other speeches that all who are not of his party are Bolsheviks. I will take no insults from him," declared James Simpson, with emphasis.

While it was suggested that the attendance at the congress would amount to 1,000 delegates, union organizers doubted if it would exceed four hundred. They admitted that the "Bolshevik" delegates were not serious, and that the congress was a sham. They said that the representation from the maritime provinces and western Canada would not be as large as in other years.

CITY SECURES ANOTHER BIG PLANT WHICH WILL EMPLOY 700 HANDS
London Bids Fair to Become One of the Most Important Motor Manufacturing Centres in the Dominion—Work to Start on Large New Factories Immediately.

Announcement was made today by Aid. John Bridge of the Chamber of Commerce of another large new industry for London, in the shape of a motor truck factory which will employ 700 men.

The location in London of this industry, in addition to that of the Ruggies Motor Truck Company, which was announced recently, means Mr. Bridge's location of a third large industry. This will be a malleable iron foundry, which will make castings not only for the motor truck factories, but for any firms in London and district requiring material of this kind.

The new motor truck plant will be located in the southeastern section of the city, and the tenders will be called at once for the construction of three factory buildings, 100 by 200 feet, of brick and steel construction, to cost \$250,000. These are the first of a number of buildings.

The new firm plans to make all the work done here, as well as to assemble the trucks. It is under the management of Paul Moore of Watnech, Indiana.

With the recent announcements of these two large motor truck plants being secured for the city, and the plants that the Ford Motor Company has for expansion, London bids fair to become one of the most important motor centres in the Dominion.

LOWER BREAD PRICES PREDICTED; POTATOES AT SIMCOE CHEAPER
New Wheat Crop Expected to Bring Down Flour Quotations.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—(By the Canadian Press).—That the cost of bread has reached the peak, and in view of the abundant crop of wheat, lower prices may be expected.

Coming into general consumption during the present month and October, is the opinion expressed by the economic revision of the board of commerce in its report on the cost of the production of bread in Canada for the month of July. The report shows that the average cost of producing and delivering the 24-ounce loaf worked out at 13 cents for July. The total cost per average pound of bread for July was one-tenth of a cent over the June price.

MACSWINEY SPENDS BAD NIGHT; STILL IN CONSCIOUS STATE
London, Sept. 11.—Terence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, was still conscious this morning, although he passed a very bad night, and was in an extremely exhausted condition, according to a bulletin issued by the Irish Self Determination League, following a report from Brixton Prison.

The bulletin issued by the league this afternoon said that at 1 p.m. Mayor MacSwiney was very desperate. He had not spoken all morning. It was added, "The 3 o'clock bulletin given out by the league said the mayor was much weaker."

"He appears to have completely collapsed," the bulletin stated. "His mind is getting dull, but he is still conscious."

ALBERTA HAS ATTRACTED MAJORITY OF MEN
Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Up to the end of August the soldier settlement board of Canada granted loans to 19,181 settlers actually on the land. The amount of loans approved by the board is \$76,530,675, for the following purposes:

To purchase land, \$41,638,827.
To remove encumbrances, \$2,151,273.
For permanent improvements, \$8,705,462.
For stock and equipment, \$24,036,111.

Alberta has 5,554 settlers actually established; Saskatchewan, 4,629; Manitoba, 3,170; British Columbia, 2,867; Ontario, 1,359; Quebec, 448; New Brunswick, 486; Nova Scotia, 387; and Prince Edward Island, 282.

Applications for qualification certificates have been received from 56,552 returned soldiers, and 40,820 have been qualified.

Up to the 6th of September 7,760 returned men have received free Dominion lands through the soldier settlement board.

A statement by the soldier settlement board also shows that 268 soldiers have purchased school lands of an area of 62,672 acres.

CANADIAN LIVE STOCK BRITISH TROOPS THRIVING IN GREECE OCCUPY TOWN OF SHAREBAN
Hens From Dominion Proving Satisfactory in New Country.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—By the Canadian Press.—The humble Canadian hen is doing her best to lay the foundation of a poultry population in Greece, and incidentally the noble Clydesdale and Canadian horse is enhancing the value of the Greek live stock as the result of the security of the country at the present time by the Greek Government.

Some time ago there was purchased for the government of that country a shipment of prize poultry. These included Plymouth Rocks, Orpingtons and White Wyandottes, all of famous Canadian strains. At the same time a number of Canadian Clydesdales and Canadian-bred Clydesdale grade horses were purchased and shipped to Greece. The poultry and animals will be the subject of tests to see how the Canadian stock will prosper in the Greek climate, and under conditions as they obtain in that country.

If the first shipments do well in Greece after they have become acclimatized, it is expected that this will be the beginning of an important export trade in live stock for Canada.
