LONDON, Eng., Cot. 7.—Sir A. Conan Doyle and E. D. Morel have placed themselves at the head of a movement to hold mass meetings thruout the United Kingdom for the purpose of making the public realize the situation in the Congo and to arouse public opinion and thus force government action. Sir A. Conan Doyle has just returned r.m. G. rattar, Seen at his Sussex r m G. ra'tar, Seen at his Sussex home he said:

"We are going to hold aseries of great public meetings in all parts of the kingdom in order to bring home the facts of dom in order to bring home the latts of the present reign of terror and atroci-ous misgovernment in the Congo. The first Congo reform meeting will be at Newcastle Nov. 8, followed by a great mass meeting in London on Nov. 18. All the religious denominations will be united in this movement in the interest

Once the people of England know the facts and have heard the statements of eye-witnesses and seen the photographs of mutilated men, women and children, I am sure they will rise with us and put an end to these crimes. of humanty.

"The government cannot do anything effectual until the people of the country are enlightened as to the real horrors, and stand behind the government as a driving force. I wish the public to co-operate and call for an end of this long orgy of blood, lust and greed. "I have a photograph of a poor black child, with a mutilated hand and leg. We stand for the murdered and malmed men, women and children of the Congo, and this is a heart call to the men and women of England. This country took a most solemn pledge when the Congo Free State was created, and one article of that treaty was that we bound ourselves in the name of the Almighty God with a solemn oath to watch over the preservation of the native races, and the amelioration of the moral and material conditions of their existence.
