

government expenditures, it is still much below what it was 15 or 20 years ago. While it is rising now, it is not at a level which has not been sustained or is not sustainable in an economy the size of this country's which will probably reach \$233 billion in the coming fiscal year—that is the total GNP of the economy. The federal public debt is a portion of that but is not, in our view, an alarming proportion at this time.

**Mr. Lawrence:** Mr. Speaker, bearing in mind the well known and traditional propensity of successive Liberal governments to buy their way into power in the province of Quebec, I wonder if the minister could explain to the House the very obvious imbalance, in respect of major capital public works expenditures? In the province of Quebec public works expenditures and the National Capital Region expenditures together total over \$164 million in this election year. In contrast, in the province of Ontario the public works capital expenditures and the National Capital Region expenditures total \$41.5 million, that is, \$164 million against \$41.5 million. Can the minister explain such an obvious imbalance in these figures?

**Mr. Andras:** Mr. Speaker, I would be glad to let my colleagues, the Minister of Public Works (Mr. Buchanan) or the Minister of State for Urban Affairs (Mr. Ouellet), who is responsible for the National Capital Region, note this question and deal with it in great detail for the hon. member. There are many factors involved, however, commitments for the completion of buildings, and obviously there is a fairly major expenditure involved in buildings in the city of Hull, as part of the National Capital which happens to be in the province of Quebec. This is a decision which was made some years ago and on which work is being completed now. I shall ask my two colleagues to reply in detail, and I am sure they will look forward to it.
