7000 Spectators See Ljungstrom Win The Marathon Derby on Saturday

Johansen Second and Abbie Woods of Montreal Third—Meadows Fourth.

ISLAND STADIUM, May 7. (Special.)—There were fully 7000 people at the new Island Stadium when the nine runners faced the starter for the 25th Canadian 21-mile Derby. The track was reduced to five laps to the mile on account of the poor condition of the track, and a new grass track was laid out, which was in excellent shape.

Sellen still leading in third lap; others far behind. Runners close, with Ljungstrom, who moved up to fifth. Holmer made a move up on back of Sellen, but Sellen was still leading the lap.

Sellen led at end of third mile, with Holmer second, and Meadows third. Ljungstrom was fourth, followed by Abbie Woods, Johansen, and Red Hawk. The race is over—Ljungstrom 1st, Johansen 2nd, Wood 3rd, Meadows 4th, Red Hawk 5th, Time 1:51:31.5.

Ljungstrom is still running easy. The runners are all strung around the track. Ljungstrom has lapped Wood at 17 miles, and is running away from the rest. He came up again, but the Swede is in great form. Johansen was second. Time for 17 miles was 1:24:35.

The crowd has lost interest in the race, and it is now a matter of will the runners now on the track run the distance? Time for 18 miles 1:42:42.5. Time for 19 miles 1:48:50. Time for 20 miles 1:51:31.5.

The order of the finish was: Ljungstrom, Johansen, Wood, Meadows, 4th, Red Hawk, 5th. Time 1:51:31.5.

Ljungstrom has lapped Woods again and now Johansen has lapped Woods. The crowd have left the stands and are crowding in the field, making it almost impossible to see the runners. The race is over—Ljungstrom 1st, Johansen 2nd, Wood 3rd, Meadows 4th, Red Hawk 5th, Time 1:51:31.5.

Richard Horwood Dead. Spoke of King's Demise When He Was Stricken. Richard Horwood died suddenly Saturday morning at 5 o'clock. He had been speaking to Mrs. Horwood of the comparatively sudden death of the King and a few minutes had himself passed away.

Nord Alexis, Hayti's Deposed President. Story of Bloodthirsty Ruler, Who Was Driven Into Exile A Year Ago.

Gen. Nord Alexis, who was president of Hayti from 1902 to 1908, died in Kingston, Jamaica, yesterday, of extreme old age. Some said that he was more than one hundred years old. Undoubtedly he was ninety, at least. He was exiled to Jamaica when the people of Hayti turned against him and threw him out of the presidency, a little over a year ago.

Nord Alexis was born, according to the best authorities, at Cape Haytien on August 2, 1820. He was a member of the court of Henri Christophe, who in 1811 called himself King Henry I of Hayti. His mother was a daughter of Baron Pavis, and god-daughter of Christophe himself.

Triumphant Return. There the two plotted a triumphant return. They went back to Hayti in 1851, and Salnavé himself proclaimed protector of the republic. The congress, however, promptly adopted a constitution, cutting down his term to six years, and made him a self-dictator, but the people arose and overthrew him. He was tried and shot. Alexis was made minister of the interior in the provisional government which followed.
