DYNAMITE EXPLOSION INJURES MONTREALERS

Ernest Vallee Loses Arm and Companion Has Jaw Broken by Ignition of Caps in Boat House.

MONTREAL, March 30.—Fooling with dynamite caps led to Ernest Vallee of Duvernay-street, losing his left hand, and Joseph McDonald getting his jawbone broken at a boathouse on LaSalle-road. The explosion occurred just as a Rapid car was passing, and the motorman stopped and attended to Vallee's injuries and took him to Verdun, where he, with his companion, was attended to by Dr. Chabot, who completed the dressing and called an ambulance. At Notre Dame Hospital it was found necessary to amputate Vallee's arm at the wrist. His companion's injuries were slight. The boathouse was burned to the ground.

PORTABLE LUMBER MILL

New Sectional Steel Building to Replace One Destroyed by Fire. The Ruby Manufacturing Co., 299 Keat Building, are erecting something unique in the way of a lumber mill, for Mr. W. A. Dunn, to replace the one recently destroyed by fire on Davenport-road. The building is to be of structural steel, clad with 24 or 22 gauge galvanized steel sheets. It will be erected in such a way that it will be collapsible and portable. The sections can all be unbolted from the inside, and the whole building taken down ready for removal in an hour or so. The cost is said to be about \$6000.

REV. PATRICK MORGAN NEVER A PRIEST.

Editor Sunday World: Last Sunday evening a sermon was preached in the Queen-street Methodist Church under the auspices of the Rev. C. O. Johnston, by a man named Patrick Morgan, who claimed that he had been a priest of the Roman Catholic Church. This statement I immediately denied. Rev. Mr. Johnston took issue and stated that Mr. Morgan was recognized by the Ministerial Association of Ottawa. Mr. Johnston also stated that Mr. Morgan went thru the Victorian Catholic University in England. In answer to Mr. Johnston's assertion it hardly follows that because the Ministerial Association of Ottawa recognizes Mr. Morgan that he must necessarily be a priest of the Catholic Church. If we were to follow this reasoning, as Mr. Johnston has recognized Mr. Morgan, therefore he could make him a bishop. As for the "Victorian Catholic University" in England, this must be the place where the famous "Liturgium Manuel," so often alluded to by Mr. Johnston, is published; but to be serious, let me say, for Mr. Johnston's information, that there is not such a university in all England. It would be better for him if he would be positive that his information is correct, before he gives it publicity. However, as to Mr. Morgan's connection with the Catholic Church, I give you below copy of a letter I have received from the Superior of the Capuchin Fathers in Ottawa, and which was sent them originally from Wales, Franciscan Monastery, Pantasaph, Holywell, North Wales.

In reply to yours, I beg to state: (1) H. Morgan was born May 13, 1853, at 44 Rockfield-road, Walton, Liverpool.

(2) That he was received into the church and baptized on the 10th of October, 1864, at St. Paul's, West Derby, Liverpool, by Rev. P. O'Farrell. He then took Harold Patrick as his name.

(3) He studied at Ushaw for some time, I cannot say how long, until he left on the 19th of April, 1896. He was certified to us as of "good conduct," and as enjoying "freedom from any taint."

(4) He came to us shortly after the last date as a cleric-novice and remained a few months. To start with, he was satisfactory, but later became strange and irregular. The cause of this was discovered to be opium, which he derived from poppy heads taken from the gardens. He was cautioned and did not amend. Therefore we dismissed him.

(5) He took no vows. So far as I can gather, he has no title to Ph. D. He holds, I understand, good certificates for engineering from Liverpool University, but evidently finds his present task more lucrative.

It will be therefore seen that the claims made by the Rev. Mr. Johnston are denied by the Superior of the Capuchin Fathers. Mr. Patrick Morgan was never ordained a priest of the Catholic Church in England or anywhere else. I trust that Mr. Johnston, as a good citizen should do, will make the amende honorable by apologizing to those members of his congregation who really thought they were listening to a real, live (and very scarce specimen of the human species) viz. an ex-priest of the Catholic Church.
