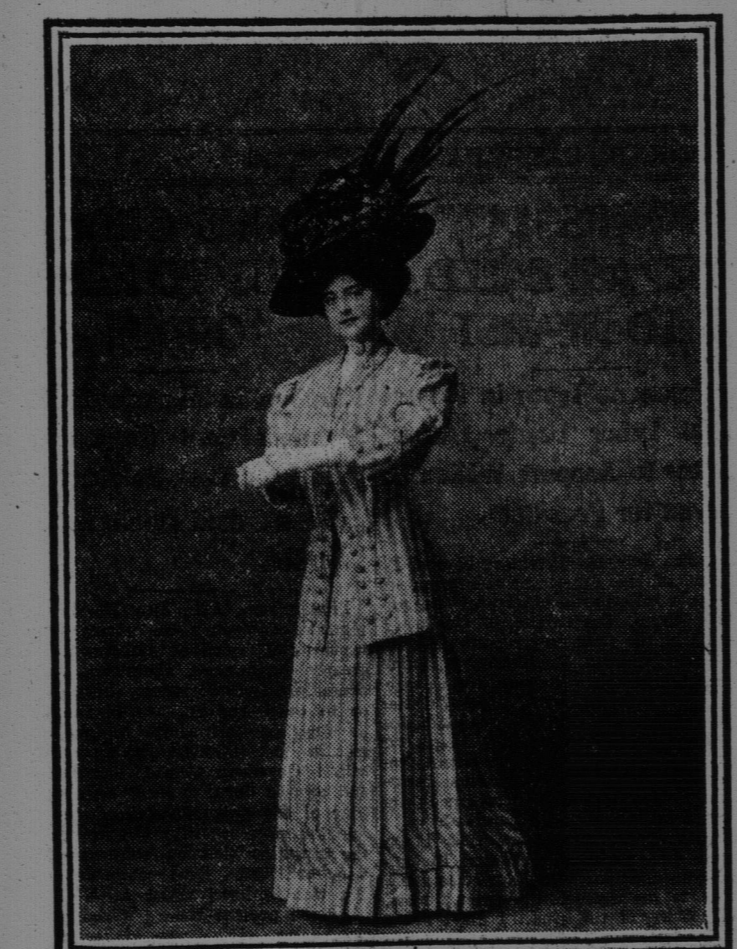
The Midnight Guest

Y.M.C.A. RUNNERS ARE HOURS AHEAD OF TIME

New York, July 17.—Tonight A. A. Jamieson of the Twenty-third street branch of the Young Men's Christian Association, who was in charge of the New York-Chicago race over the first division, which was from this city to Buffalo, gave the official figures of the race to the division of his jurisdiction. He said: "Favored by good weather, the boys runners were able to make far better time than had been anticipated. It took 95 runners to carry the message from the City Hall here to Buffalo. J. E. Edgett, of Moncton, was in the city yesterday."

CROWN JEWELS TEMPT CLEVEREST CRIMINALS

The theft of the crown jewels from Dublin Castle is all the more remarkable when one comes to reflect upon the elaborate precautions that are invariably taken to safeguard these costly gems, says The Bits. In this particular case, it will be remembered an armed sentry was on duty day and night outside the apartment where was kept the safe in which they were stored. Yet they were undoubtedly stolen, though when and by whom is, at the moment, a mystery. In like manner they disappeared, once upon a time, the Scottish regalia, now preserved in Edinburgh Castle. These historic relics consist of a jeweled crown, part of which, at least, encircled the brow of Robert Bruce; a sword of state the gift of Pope Julius II, to James IV, a scepter, and an antique silver "rod of office." At the date of the Union these were safe. Soon after they were missing, although whether stolen or simply mislaid nobody seemed able to tell. Nor has the mystery been properly cleared up to this day. All that is known for certain is that in the year 1318 they were restored to the light of day, having been accidentally found hidden away in an old oak chest in one of the cellars of the building. There have been three attempts to steal the state jewels, of Eng. which are kept in the Tower of London, by serious by far being that engineered by a certain Col. Blood, who actually succeeded in getting possession for a time of the crown and scepter. This he did by overpowering and binding the aged keeper, with the assistance of two confederates, a French paragon of the art, and an alarm, and help arriving from an unexpected quarter, the three desperadoes were pursued and overtaken, although not before they had got clear of the precincts of the building with the precious booty. It was this affair which caused the authorities to adopt the elaborate precautions for effectually guarding these priceless treasures which are in vogue, practically unchanged, at the present day. They consist in a special military guard of picked men, the giving and receiving of a countersign which changed every twenty-four hours, and the establishment of a rigid system of visiting patrols, rounds, etc., at night supplemented by special watchmen in the daytime. Besides all this, the bulk of the most valuable of the jewels are secured by a massive iron grating the keys of which are in the possession of the lord chamberlain, out of whose personal custody they are never supposed to be. Curiously enough, this seeming superfluity of caution very nearly resulted in the destruction of the entire collection by the great fire which broke out in the Tower in October, 1841. The flames had actually invaded the jewel house before Mr. Swire, the keeper, had succeeded with the aid of
