## CHARLOTTE COUNTY

## TEACHERS' MEETINGS

St. Stephen, Sept. 24—The sessions of the Charlotte County Teachers' Institute were brought to a close today. The closing session was held this afternoon. After the opening routine, Dr. Sullivan delivered a most interesting and instructive address on tuberculosis. He stated that one-seventh of the deaths in this county were due to the white plague and it was thus making fearful havoc among our young people. Teachers can do much to check its ravages by instructing the pupils and informing the people of their

districts. One of the most successful checks was destruction of the sputum. The address made a deep impression upon the institute and the members went to their respective districts fully determined to stamp out the dread disease. The thanks of the institute was tendered Dr. Sullivan. Officers elected were: Miss Annie Richardson, St. Andrews, president; James Vroom, St. Stephen, vice-president; F. O. Sullivan, St. Stephen, secretary-treasurer. Additional members of executive, W. H. Morrow, principal of St. Andrews grammar school; Goldwin Lord, principal of St. George superior school, and Miss Eleanor Dewolf, St. Stephen.

The time and place of the next meeting was left to the executive. One hundred and seven members were enrolled and one of the largest and most interesting sessions of the institute was brought to a close by singing the national anthem. The presence of Chief Superintendent Carter, Chancellor Jones and Inspector McLean greatly aided in making the institute so successful. Chief Supt. Carter and Miss Carter went to St. John this afternoon by New Brunswick Southern.

## THE KINDERGARTENS

Annual Meeting—Now Being Arranged—The Relation to Public Schools

The monthly meeting of the Free Kindergarten Association will be held on Tuesday next, at 3.30 in the W. C. T. U. parlour, Germain street. Arrangements for the annual meeting will be completed and there are several items of importance to be discussed.

Portland street kindergarten cannot take any more pupils, as they have seven more now than the proper enrollment. The other two kindergartens have not yet their full number.

It is to be regretted that some of the parents obtained permits for their children to go to the public schools without consulting the kindergartens, as some were not at all ready to leave the kindergarten. Some children are developed at five and one-half years old, and others not until six or seven.

It is also to be regretted that children going from private schools say that they came from a kindergarten.

No private school, the kindergarten committee say, can in any sense be a kindergarten even if it uses all the occupations of the Froebel system, unless the young lady at the head of the school has a diploma, which takes two years of studying theory, and two years practice in a kindergarten to obtain.

This year mothers who entrust their children to the free kindergartens will be asked to comply with the teachers in reference to their children attending public school, as the kindergarten for the child means two years, from four to six, generally, and not a few months. The schools will never be able to fairly judge the kindergarten unless this matter is properly adjusted.

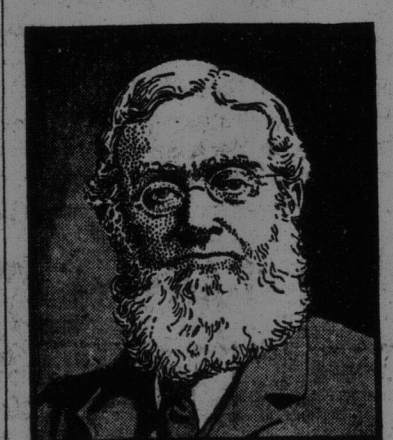

## SAILINGS OF ALLAN LINE

## FROM HERE ANNOUNCED

The winter sailings for the Allan Line have just been announced and are published herewith. This year there will be twenty sailings of steamers of this line from St. John. On twelve of these the steamers will call at Halifax and eight will be direct. Of the Allan line boats St. John will have about two a week and Halifax about one. The steamers in the service this season are the two turbin, the Virginian and the Tunisian, with the Canadian, Hesperian and the Tunisian.
