This gives the gases in the leavening property (the eggs, soda or baking power) an opportunity to work gradually as the heat increases gradually.

The heat reaches the maximum desired at the end of the first quarter of the baking period and the

gases have, for the most part expended themselves

The oven door SHOULD NOT BE OPENED during the SECOND and THIRD QUARTRS of the baking period, for the cells at that time are not firm and a slight jar may cause them to settle. The warm expended air which makes the cake light has already been evolved, and there is nothing present

3—Angel-food cakes may be put into a cold oven and the heat allowed to come on very gradually, or should be put into a very slow oven that has not been pre-heated more than three or four

4—Quick breads should go to the top-most part of the oven, and a hot oven should be ready for them. Muffins, which require from twenty to thirty minutes for baking, should be placed in the top of the oven. Biscuits should not be in the oven more than twelve to fifteen minutes at the most, and should be baken with a very hot oven, at the top-

5—Broiled meats must be handled very carefully. The oven should be pre-heated at least ten min-

utes before the meat is put in, but the broiling pan should be removed from the oven before the heat

A hot porcelain broiling pan draws the juices from the under side of the meat, and prevents it from browning nicely when turned.







YARMOUTH, June 20 — Walter Sprague, of Weymouth Mills, who was brought to the Yarmouth Hospital on Thursday evening last, suffering from ST. MARTIN'S FIRE severe gunshot wounds in his face, self inflicted, passed away suddenly yesterday. In a sulcidal attempt he deliberately discharged a 22 gauge shot gun into his face three times with the result that the entire right side of his took place about two miles from here, in what is known as the Chester section, early on Friday morning. The

face was blown away and half of the fire destroyed the dwelling house and lower jaw gone.

Despite the awfulness of that injury Sprague's condition, after the wounds received attention, was most encouraging and he made very favorable pro-
