In comparing the city with two other Canadian cities we find Toronto, with a population of half a million people, has 50 dealers distributing her milk supply; while Ottawa, with a population of over one hundred thousand has two distributors, consequently we can find no city in Canada by which a fair comparison could be made with St. John due to the fact that the milk business is largely in the hands of tributing territory is so arranged a few distributing plants whose distributing territory is so arranged that there is no overlapping of routes and in consequence the average load distributed per team is practically double the largest olad delivered in the City of St. John. The City of Detroit with a population of over a million and a quarter people is supplied by fifty dealers with the result that the overlapping of routes is rare and capacity loads are car ried.



Engineers Will Harness Rivers in Ontario; Make Them Run Backwards

Port Arthur, Nov. 24—Engineers sent out by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission to report on the possibility of the diversion to the south of the waters which are now flowing north and into Lake Nipigon, to make possible further development of power at Cameron Falls, are to return to Toronto some time this week to make their report direct to Sir Adam Beck...

When Sir Adam was in Port Arthur a year ago, speaking to a gathering of citizens, he mentioned the possibilities for power development by cutting through a section of the height of land north of Lake Nipigon, and by so doing releasing waters into Lake Nipigon. His estimate that the Hydro would spend upward of \$15,000,000 in this section in the next five years included the water-diversion scheme.

SHIPS SUFFER

DR. GRANT SUFFERS NERVE BREAKDOWN New York Clergyman Will be Subject of Consulation

Two Collisions.

The four-masted lumber schooner Perry S. Setzer was almost cut in two, and its skipper, Captain A. J. Wilson, of Fairhaven, Mass., killed outright at the time of its collision with some unidentified craft, off Diamond shoals, North Carolina, Saturday morning. About that time only a few miles away, the starboard bow of the City of Montgomery ripped into another unidentified craft.

Capt. Tolson of the wrecking tug

Joseph D. Wood reported that he had the Setzer in tow until the schooner broke away in the storm.

Capt. Wilson, master of the schooner, had refused to abandon his ship despite its water-logged condition, and his crew stuck with him. The schooner was in an almost helpless condition when it broke away and was struck by the unidentified craft. The eight members of its crew after clinging to the rigging of the almost submerged ship were finally rescued by the oil tanker Solana, 15 miles north of Cape Hatteras, 12 hours after the collision.
