SOVIET TRADE MAN IN LONDON **CLAIMS VICTORY**

Says Wrangel's Force in Kuban Province Annihilated and He Now Holds Only Crimea.

London, Aug. 81—Anti-Bolsheviki forces landed in the province of Kuban, east of the Sea of Azio, by General Baron Wrangel have been "completely annihilated," says a statement issued here last night by M. Kameneff, head of Russian Bolsheviki trade delegation in this city, based on a telegram from Moscow.

"In the northern part of the government of Taurida," he said "Gen. Wrangel's army is completely beaten. He now holds only the Crimea."

Paris, Aug. 81—(Jewish Tetegraphic Agency)—General Wrangel has proposed the formation of an alliance with Gen. Petlura, Ukrainian leader, according to a prominent Ukrainian organ. It says that Gen. Wrangel expressed his readiness to recognize the independence of the Ukraine.
