They asked that money be sent to them. The hotel man was not aware that his parents were on the way out and he referred the matter to the mayor of his town.

On investigating Mayor Schofield could not find that people answering the description had arrived here by any of the steamers and he wired the mayor of Bdmonton to this effect. This morning he received a wire saying that the mystery had been apparently cleared up and asking him to take no further action umless advised. No details as to how the matter was cleared up were included in the wire.
