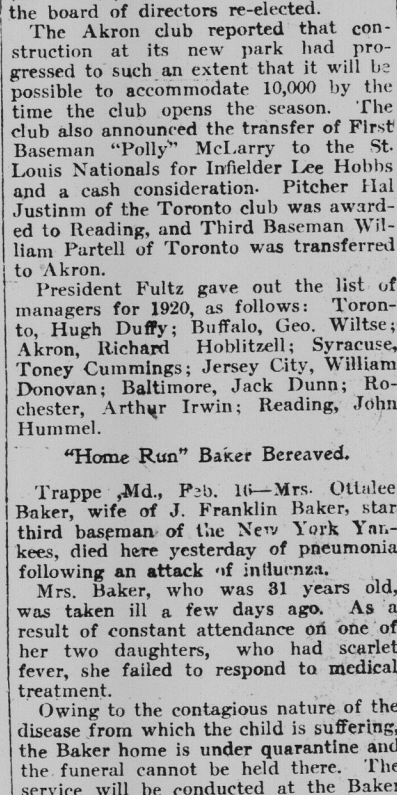

## SPORT IN CANADA

Indications Are This Will Be the Greatest of All Years for All Branches in the Provinces.

With the advent of 1920 outdoor sport is gradually hitting its stride and as each season comes and goes we are due to see amateur sporting events staged as in pre-war days.

Hockey, being as it is, Canada's national sport, has been given a new lease of life and local leagues were formed wherever the puck-chasers were lucky enough to have rinks. The last few seasons seem to have been open ones on rinks. The Halifax Arena was destroyed in the explosion of 1917, the Truro rink was sold and taken down, and the Amherst, Moncton and Kentville rinks were destroyed by fire. However, all the winter with the exception of Halifax, have ice surfaces now. A number of games have already been played and the hockey season is well advanced.

Baseball is bound to boom this season. The boys that played ball in France and England learned a lot of the fine points of the game and the popularity of the players that worked out with better and faster men "over there" are better for the experience. One thing the writer has noticed about the players that have donned their "dies" is the fact that there is less "craziness" than formerly and it is a pretty raw decision that brings down a call on the head of the umpire. The discipline of army life has had its effect in the minds of the men just out of khaki that feeling of not wanting to "talk back" but whatever is the cause it is a good thing for baseball and we feel sure the different town leagues will run smoother than in previous years. A provincial league of "home brew" players would be a draw card and there is every possibility of this being formed.

Tennis was again revived in the fall of 1919 and the first provincial tournament since 1914 was staged in Halifax. The younger players were absolutely refused but the old champions defended their honors successfully in nearly every case. The 1920 tournament will be held in Truro where the club is making extensive preparations and have added to the already fine lay-out two new clay courts.

Much Interest in Shooting. Trap shooting in this neck-of-the-woods is also going to receive a lot of attention during the coming year. Halifax-Dartmouth, St. John, Truro, and Yarmouth have hunting clubs and the coming year will see the staging of the Maritime Trap Shooting Association meet. Both St. John and Halifax are bidding for this event and both have facilities and executives that make it possible for a successful carrying through of the inter-provincial meet.

The Dominion Cartridge Company are forming clubs wherever possible and from present indications the Amherst Gun Club, the members of which have not been shooting during the last few years, Moncton, Fredericton, Bridgewater, Lunenburg, Kentville and Windsor will have clubs and with members that will be able to break up a good percentage of the flying disk. Trap shooting makes a hit wherever introduced and once tried makes of about one hundred per cent of the novices dyed-in-the-wool fans.

**SITUATION OVER MONTREAL CARPENTERS HAS GROWN SERIOUS**  
Montreal, Feb. 18.—At a meeting of the carpenters' union last night it was decided to insist upon an eight hour day and a wage of eighty cents an hour. These demands were absolutely refused by the builders. The situation is so serious that J. T. Donlin, president of the building trades of the American Federation of Labor, has been sent for to take charge.

**NOW SAY GOULD MAY NOT GO TO EUROPE.**

The rumor may only have delayed his trip, but those who should know say that it is doubtful if he will take the trip at all. It is said that he will take a rest in the Laurentides and will leave at the end of the present week.

OUR LUMBER TO UNITED STATES

Matter is Brought to the Notice of the Board of Commerce.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—(By Canadian Press) The Board of Commerce has been asked to consider the problem of a threatened lumber shortage in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, caused by the steady shipment of the Canadian supply to the United States.

United States firms are said to be conserving their own supply and buying up a large part of the visible supply in western Canada for their present use. The board of commerce is considering the matter today.

The Board of Commerce is in receipt of similar communications from Toronto. Should the need for action in the line of placing an embargo on export of lumber arise, it would seem that the matter is one for the whole government to take up and decide whether such action should be taken.
