FORMER KAISER PLANS LEAVING FOR GERMANY

Get Out of Holland Before Surrender Demanded

AN APPEAL BY OFFICERS

Request Netherlands to Refuse to Give up Ex-Ruler—Crown Prince That Was Again Predicted New War in Ten Years

Berlin, June 27.—(By the Associated Press)—Former Emperor, Wilhelm, is planning to return to Germany before the Entente can demand his surrender from Holland, according to a Stuttgart despatch to the New Berliner Zeitung. The despatch states that the Dutch government "thoroughly approves of his return, as the former emperor is an unwelcome guest and his presence in Holland is increasing the problems before that country."

Coblenz, June 26.—(By the Associated Press)—The following advertisement is appearing in newspapers in various parts of unoccupied Germany, being a part of a campaign which is said to be going on under the auspices of the officers' allies. "We have telegraphed the Holland government as follows: 'The German Officers' alliance, filled with gratitude for the hospitality afforded the German Kaiser by Holland, in the name of millions of Germans request the government of the Netherlands to refuse to deliver the Kaiser to the Entente. We cannot now defend our former war lord with our bodies, but we expect the magnanimity of the Dutch government in this final and most humiliating disgrace.'"

The Ex-Crown Prince. London, June 27.—After peace is signed I will return to Germany to live on my estates in Silesia and perform my duties as a landowner, said the former German crown prince, as an interview last week at Wieringen, according to a Brussels despatch to the Daily Mirror. He is also quoted as declaring that "I will remain in Silesia until I have seen the peace treaty signed by the Entente. This will not be in ten years."

Geneva, June 27.—(By the Associated Press)—A request from Dr. Brundage, former chairman of the League of Nations, that the health of the former ruler is giving rise to anxiety, has not left the hope that the emperor is being attended by a Swiss doctor. Former Emperor Zita is acting as a nurse for her husband, an interview in Paris, June 27.—Recent Berlin despatches printed in Paris newspapers are recalled, in which the emperor was reported to have placed persons, commenting on the sinking of the German fleet in Scapa Flow and the burning of the fleet, and that he was not surprised and declared that other equally startling events might be anticipated.

SAYS HE HAS NOT ESCAPED. The Hague, June 27.—The former German crown prince, whose escape from Holland to Germany had been reported, was still at his residence on the Island of Wieringen in the Zuider Zee this morning, it was officially announced this afternoon.

Paris, June 27.—Paris newspapers state that the Council of Four has decided to call the attention of the Dutch government to the grave consequences which might follow should the former Crown Prince of Germany escape from Holland and to ask that the Dutch government be increased in vigilance.

SCHEIDEMANN A FUGITIVE? Geneva, June 26.—Philipp Scheidemann, former German chancellor, arrived in Switzerland last night, according to the National Zeitung of Basle. It is said the Swiss federal authorities have granted him permission to remain ten days on account of his health, but Constantine newspapers state that he fled from Germany because he feared assassination.

IMPORTANT ACTION RE WAR GRATUITY. Ottawa, June 27.—By order in council the government has taken action of great importance regarding the war service gratuity. It will be remembered that under previous regulations the war service gratuity on the higher scale was retroactive beyond November 11, 1918, only with respect to such men as served in the actual theatre of war. This is now changed and the gratuity will be paid on the higher scale (minimum three months, maximum six months) to all those who served overseas. With respect to those who served only in Canada, the regulation is made retroactive beyond November 11, 1918, to all those who served for a period of one year or over.

Woodstock Gripped By A Serious Fire

Hon. F. B. Carvell's Offices Damaged; Carleton Sentinel Suffers; Carding Mill Destroyed; Flour Mill Damaged

Woodstock, N. B., June 27.—Fire which started in a carding mill this morning totally destroyed the building and contents. A building adjacent, formerly used as the electric light station, was also burned. A flour mill operated by James Frigo was partially burned. A very high wind was blowing and carried burning embers over the river, starting a fire in the Sentinel building and doing an enormous lot of damage. Hon. F. B. Carvell's offices and the offices of W. Sims and F. L. McKee were in this building and all were badly damaged. The Sentinel had not finished putting out this week's issue when the employees were compelled to vacate the premises. The buildings first burned are owned by the Woodstock Electric Light Company and are insured for small amounts. Digby Visited. Digby, N. S., June 27.—A valuable wharf property and store of J. E. Snow at the Miqouette was destroyed by fire at 4:30 this forenoon. The building was well ablaze when the fire was seen and nothing could be saved. The smoke houses alongside were on fire but the flames were extinguished. What light there was carried the flames and sparks over the harbor so that the danger of other buildings catching was reduced to a minimum. Captain Snow values the property destroyed at about \$12,000, with not quite fifty per cent insurance.

At Salt Springs. Halifax, June 27.—Fire last night destroyed the station house, freight shed and home of the station agent at Salt Springs, Cumberland county, and also held up the Boston express for two hours. The origin of the fire is not known. The station was roused from Springhill Junction, six miles distant, and was successful in saving the roadbed. Frederickton, June 27.—About 500 acres of crown lands have been burned over by a forest fire on crown lands in the vicinity of Waggonville, Victoria county. The lands were under lease to the Waples Lumber Company. A telephone message from Manager Whitman at some time said that rain last night and today had subdued the flames and the fire was out. The damage was said to be approximately \$20,000, perhaps more.

DELEGATES ARE ON WAY; TREATY TO BE SIGNED TOMORROW SEND 7,500 HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Paris, June 27.—Plans were completed by the Council of Four today for the signing of the peace treaty at three o'clock Saturday afternoon. No official statement, however, was issued by the government. Coblenz, June 27.—(By the Associated Press)—Foreign Secretary Meisler in session this morning, and the two German peace delegates on their way to Versailles, passed through Coblenz at 10 o'clock this morning, sent a telephone message from Cologne. A Berlin despatch to the Cologne newspaper, however, stated that they are to sign the treaty at three o'clock Saturday afternoon. Plans for Ceremony. Paris, June 27.—While no official announcement had been made up to a late hour, it is generally expected that the ceremony of signing the peace treaty will take place at three p. m. on Saturday. The Council of Four will be in session this morning, and the signing of the treaty will be held in the afternoon. It is understood that a protocol later will be signed to the treaty stating that they signed with the understanding that Japan would return the Shantung concession to China within a stipulated time.

Comment in Paris. Paris, June 27.—(By the Associated Press)—Disappointment over what is termed the apparent weakness of the present German government, and the feeling has been expressed that the signing of this peace treaty may mean little more than the signing by the Bolsheviks at Brest-Litovsk. The defeat tone of the German note, which grudgingly agreed to sign the treaty without reservation, created an unfavorable impression on members of the Dominion Alliance. Those present stated today, and this seemingly has been intensified by the delay of the Germans in arranging for the carrying out of their promise. The peace treaty contains no provision to which they must refer. Consequently, delay in ratification may cause the peace conference additional annoyance, although it is generally agreed by the delegates that enforcement of the reparations clause need not be delayed until there is ratification by the German government.

The Turkish. The insistence of the German government in its replies to the peace conference that it cannot check outbreaks due to dissatisfaction with the terms of the treaty has made a bad impression upon delegates here, who generally regard it as an attempt to shield possible military movements. The Turks. Paris, June 26.—(By the Associated Press)—The Allied council has replied to the Turkish memorandum, saying that it could not accept the Turkish claim that its territories be restored undiminished. A detailed memorandum embodying a plea for the continuance of the old Turkish empire was submitted to the Council of Four on Tuesday by the Turkish delegation. The memorandum sets forth that the Turkish government was prepared to recognize the independence of Armenia and to grant some form of autonomous government to Palestine and Arabia, under Turkish sovereignty.

TEMPERANCE CAMPAIGN FOR THE PROVINCE. Fredericton, N. B., June 27.—A province-wide campaign for temperance was decided upon here this morning by the advisory committee on the N. B. branch of the Dominion Alliance. Those present were Donald Fraser of Plaster Rock, chairman; Rev. Thomas Marshall of Fairville; W. G. Clark of Fredericton, and Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson. Arrangements were made for the work which will be undertaken by the new field secretary on the branch, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd.
